President

Board Approves

Capital

Expenditures

The operating budget needs for the 1973-74 biennium were presented to the state Board of Higher Education for capital improvements. The first priority for capital expenditures was the renovation of Overstreet Auditorium with an addition to the stage area of classrooms, offices, workrooms and storage for the Speech and Drama Departments.

The ROTC program began its first year's operation using the old National Guard Armory, after some modifications by the Physical Plant maintenance staff. At the first awards ceremony for the ROTC, Dr. Bruce said, "This is a very fine addition to the academic program of Southern State College."

The State Board of Higher Education at their meeting on October 2, 1972, officially approved a graduate program in the field of teacher education at SSC to begin in the year 1974-75. Preparation had been under way during the current year for an evaluation of the undergraduate program on campus by the North Central Association as a step toward the beginning of the master's degree program. Consultants recommended by officials of the North Central Association and the National Association for the Accreditation of Teacher Education Programs have been working with Southern State during the 1972-73 academic year in preparation for the graduate program.

During the year Dr. Bruce attended the annual meetings of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities, the American Council on Education and the North Central Association. He served as division chairman of the United Fund Drive for the College and public school personnel.

Board of Trustees

Board Institutes Master Of Education Program To Serve Needs Of Teachers

Having had several special meetings as well as their regular meetings dealing with the role and the scope of the institution, the Board of Trustees approved by a unanimous decision the recommendation made by President Bruce that steps be taken toward instituting a Master of Education degree to serve the educational needs of the teachers living within commuting distance of the College campus.

The trustees also approved the budgets to be submitted through the Department of Higher Education to the legislature for 1973 through 1975, including the financing and renovation of, as well as the addition to, Overstreet Hall auditorium, and the construction of a new classroom building.

In addition to this, the Board of Trustees also approved a contract for the replacement of most of the roofs on the major buildings.

Initiations, Meetings And Proposals

Are Duties Of Vice Presidents

Often we see the vice presidents walking across campus, or in the Union. If we aren't acquainted with them, we think they are unconcerned or too busy to listen to our problems. When we come to "know" them, we find they are individuals who really care about the students.

Improving the counseling and tutoring services in the college residence halls, and initiating several workshops dealing with the improvement of student personnel administration, were projects Dr. Donald Haefner, Vice President of Student Affairs continued to develop from the previous year.

Writing proposals for federal grants, compiling reports for HEW, aiding in the appropriation of other programs on campus, and yearly trips to Washington, D. C., to study the federal programs are among many of Dr. Charles Jackson's du-

ties as Vice President of Administrative Research and Federal Programs. In the summer, Dr. Jackson attended the 1972 Institute for Educational Management, conducted at Harvard University Business School at Cambridge, Massachusetts.

In the fall, changes were made by Dr. L. A. Logan, Vice President for Academic Affairs, in the nursing, psychology, sociology, social science and English areas for nursing majors, in order to meet standards of the National League of Nursing.

Along with changes in the instructional program, Dr. Logan's duties include revising and assembling catalog materials, scheduling and preparing the agenda for faculty meetings, recommending faculty committee appointments and designating the duties of committees.

Emphasis Placed On Career Guidance for Undecided Students

Personal, social, and academic counseling is a part of the daily routine of the Counseling Center.

In the area of counseling, special emphasis was placed on career guidance for students who had not chosen a major. Tests and occupational materials were made available for these students.

Enlargement of the tutoring program went into effect at the beginning of the school year. The services were free, and a student could receive assistance in almost any subject area.

A two-day training workshop for the special service staff was conducted August 17-18. During the year special service personnel attended numerous meetings. They included attendance at the regional Meeting of Directors of Special Services, Arkansas Education Research and Development Council meeting and the Association of School Administrators.

The special services program also added a course in basic science for students who failed to get the necessary background in high school science.

At the beginning of the fall semester, two faculty members, Alan Brannon and Richard Reed, acted on a part-time basis as Assistant Deans of Students.

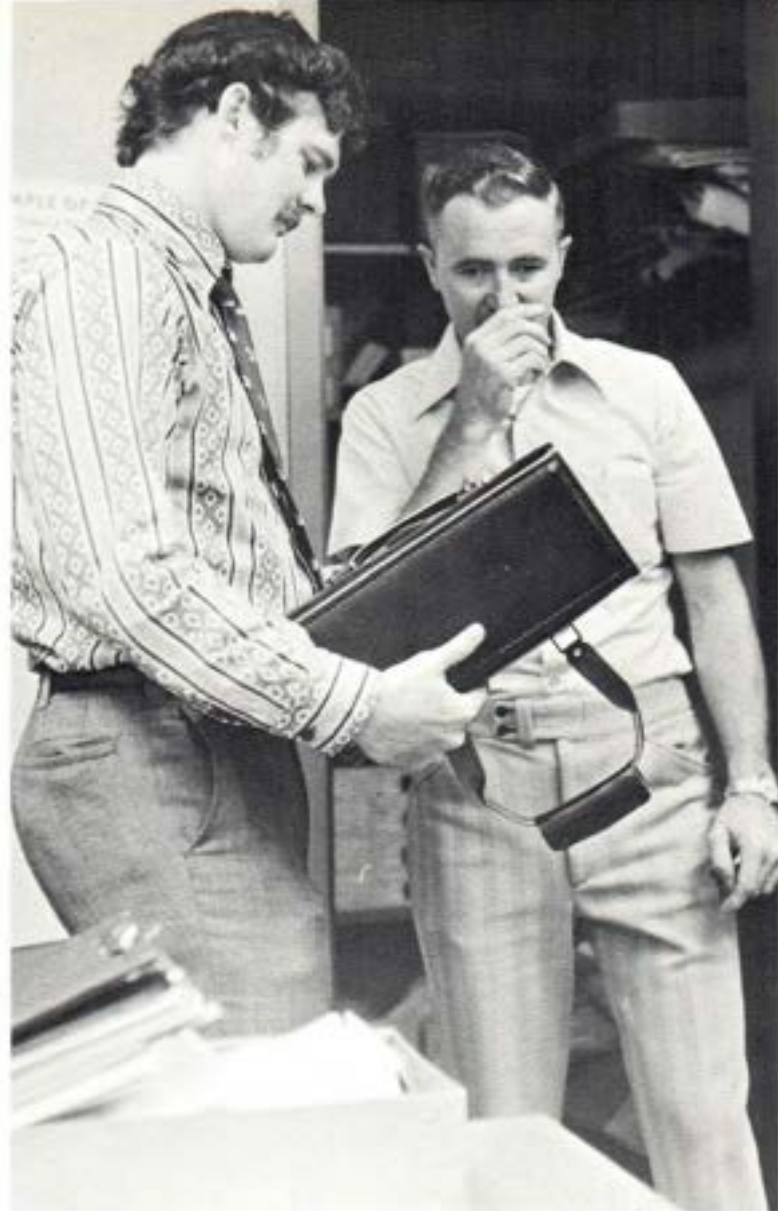
The deans worked with AMS, the administration of the housing program, the resident hall assistants, and coordinated activities on campus.

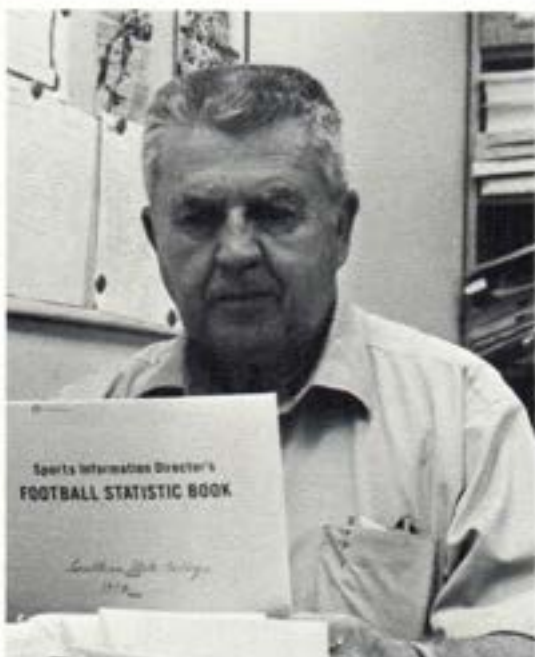

To New Library

There are still many details to be worked out concerning the interior of the new library building.

The library will be modern in concept with numerous small conference rooms which will allow students to work together in small groups. There will also be some individual faculty studies and study carrels for students.

Members of the library committee, headed by Velma Adams, have spent many hours in conference with Jack See, the interior design specialist, and with the architectural firm of Wittenberg, Delony and Davidson of Little Rock.

On the bottom of the library's three levels, classrooms and workrooms for media and library science are planned.

The staff, composed of four trained librarians, one full time secretary-office manager plus numerous student assistants, will be especially busy through the 1973 year getting ready to move from the present building to the new one scheduled for opening in October, 1973.

"Weeding" of materials no longer useful, recataloging materials in some special areas by the Library of Congress classification system now being used, and obtaining more new materials and processing them, along with giving all the usual services, means a lot of work.

The Student Health Service provides for the general medical needs of the students. It is staffed 24 hours by a full-time registered nurse, a licensed practical nurse, and two upperclass students.

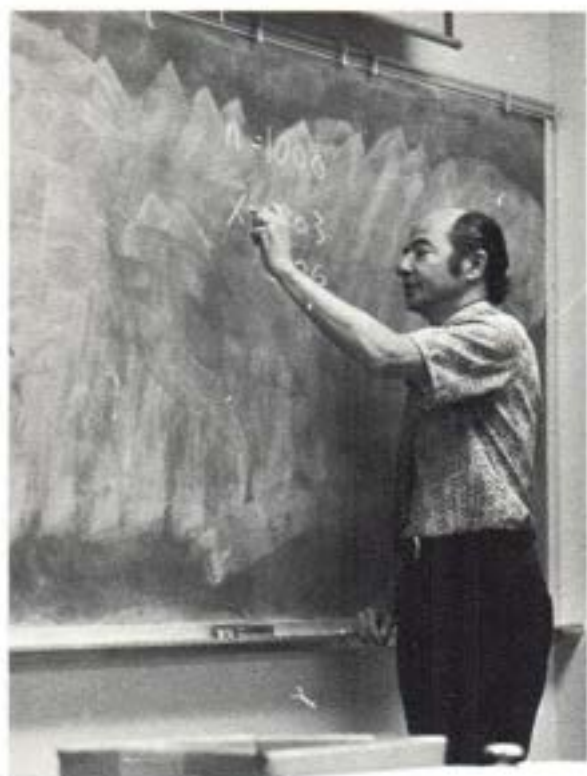

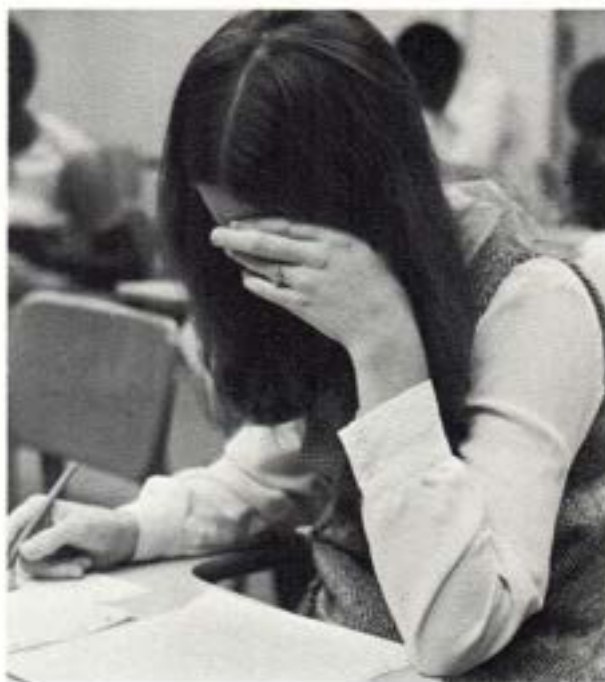

New kindergarten

Program instituted

A new program of Kindergarten Education, which meets the new Kindergarten certification requirements of the State Department of Education, was established in the fall.

Due to the revised standards for teachers and certification issued by the State Department of Education, changes had to be made in all the teacher education curriculums.

An Education Professions Development Act Project was again secured and operated at Southern State during the summer and fall term of 1970.

Southern State's NCATE approved program of Teacher Education was re-evaluated.

Two Federal grants were secured from the Arkansas Technical Assistance Center and used to operate two series of meetings around the topic "Coping with Reading Problems in Secondary Schools."

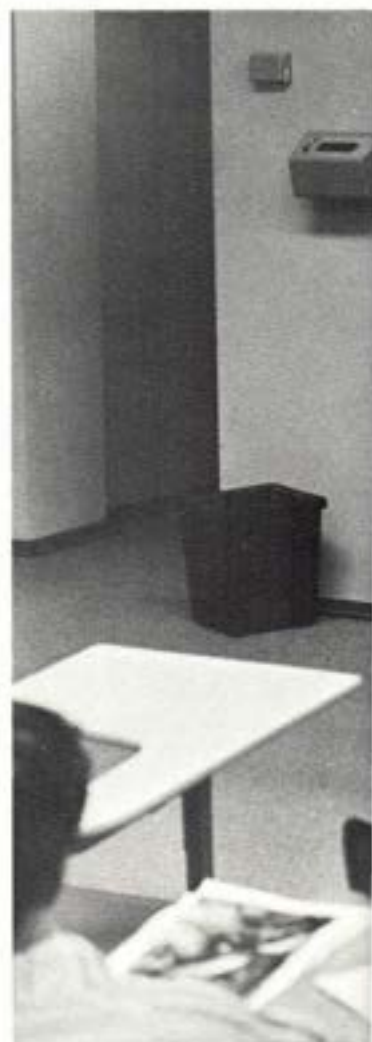

Military Science

Added To Curriculum

Military Science, a new program added to the college curriculum, began functioning in the fall semester. Ninety students enrolled as cadets in the campus army Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC).

Instruction and management of the program was under the direction of eight regular Army Officers and Non-Commissioned Officers.

"Of particular interest," said Colonel Gary L. Wilson, is the number of freshmen (77) who have volunteered for the ROTC program."

Consisting of a basic course during the first two years, qualified students selected for the advanced course will contract with the United States Army to receive a scholarship-type stipend of \$100 monthly during their junior and senior years.

Area Students Learn Through Cooperative Science Workshop



Area junior high school students learned science through a cooperative college—school science workshop conducted on campus last summer. The workshop lasted four weeks and was followed by nine seminars during the academic year. The project was supported by the National Science Foundation.

The significant feature of the ISCS method is, "it allows concepts to arise out of investigations the student has done himself," said Dr. Dodson, project director.

Faculty members from the chemistry and physics departments presented science background instruction.

The Department of Physics received a \$1900 grant from the National Science Foundation for the purchase of instructional scientific equipment. The college provides an additional \$2000 so that \$3900 of new material may be purchased as a plan for improvement of the modern laboratory course. Directing the project is Dr. Carl T. Rutledge.

Attending the Science Curriculum Improvement Studies Workshop was Marie King. The workshop was conducted at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green. In the Division of Natural Science, Daniel R. England was added to the Biology department, and Charles H. Rogers was added to the physics department.

Requirements Changed In Social Sciences

Changes were made in the pattern of courses required for a social studies major in secondary education so that a student has to take more courses in each field, except history, but has to specialize in one less field of study.

General education requirements for college algebra were revised for the BS degree program in geography, history, and political science so that a student could substitute statistics or a one-year language course. In history, the one-year language requirement was substituted for college algebra and six hours of science.

During the year, all departments reviewed and revised their program and course offerings.



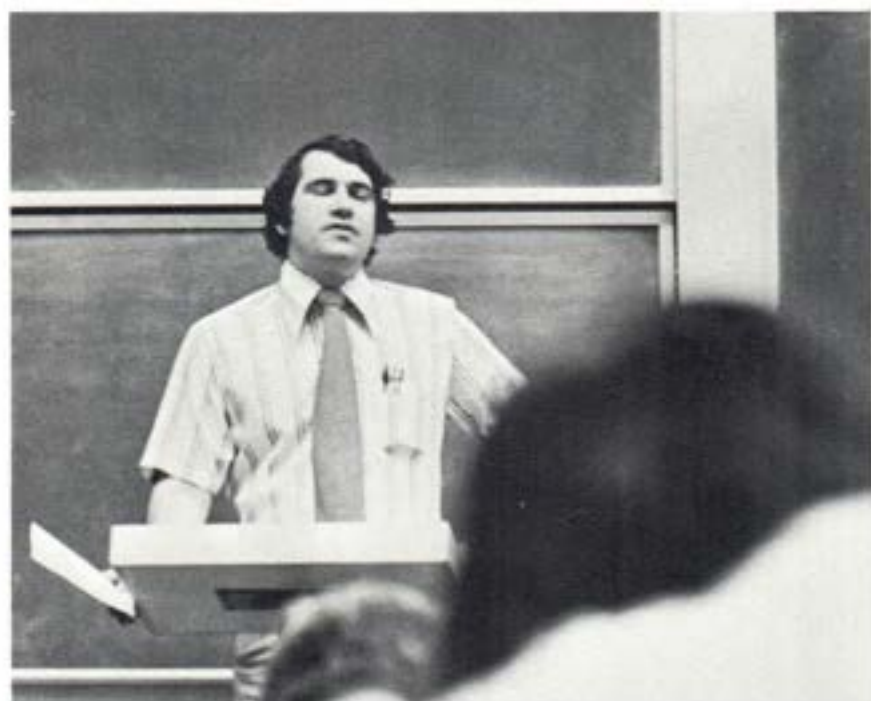

Outside consultants and field trips to various industries were conducted during the year.



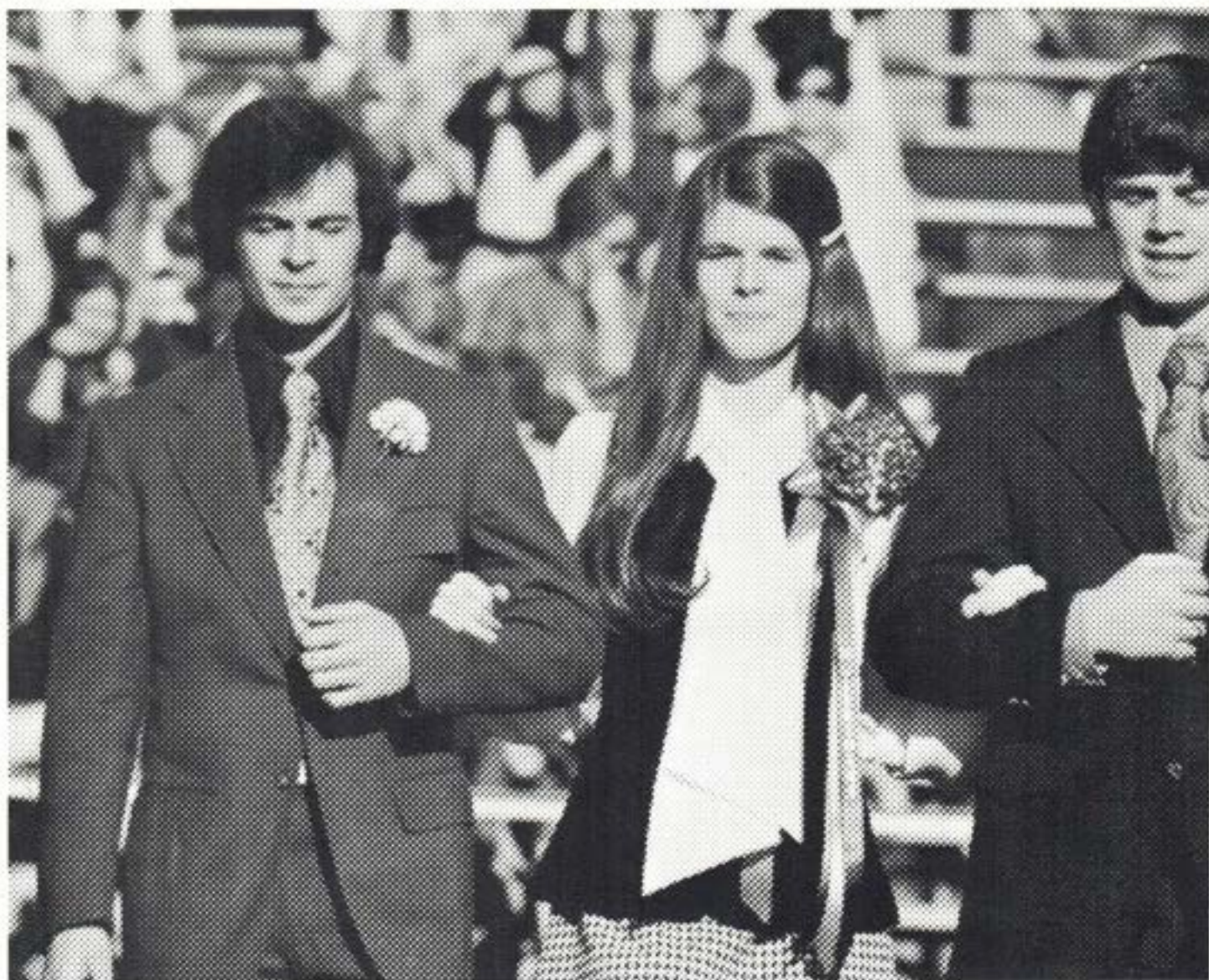

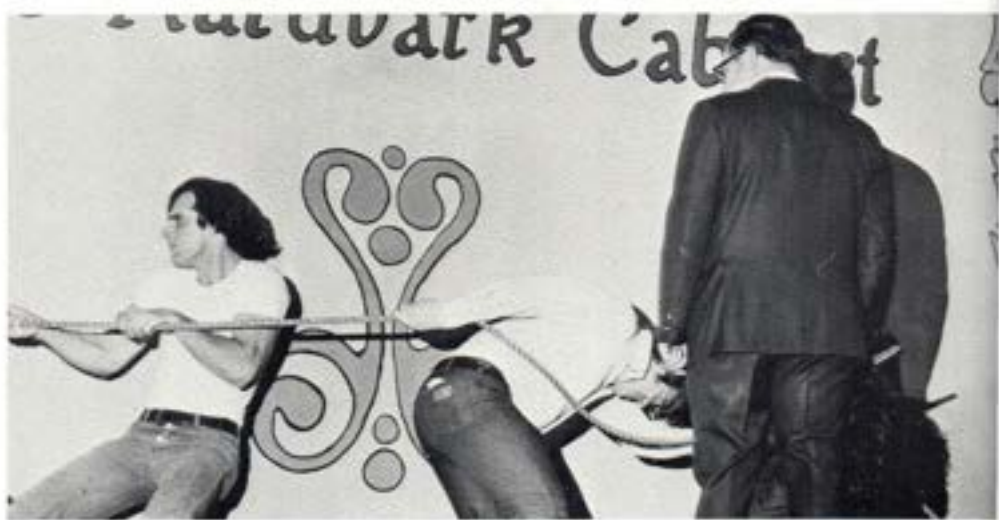

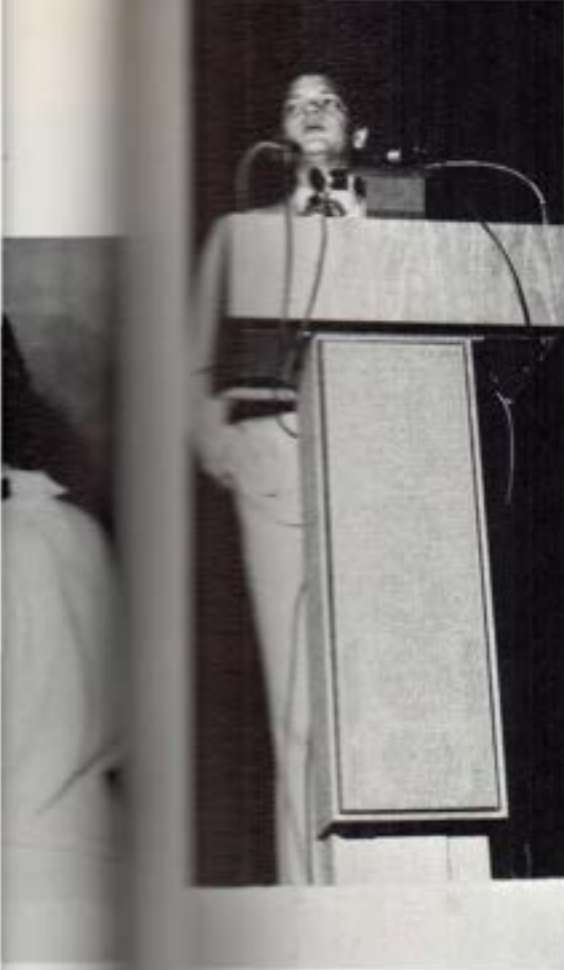




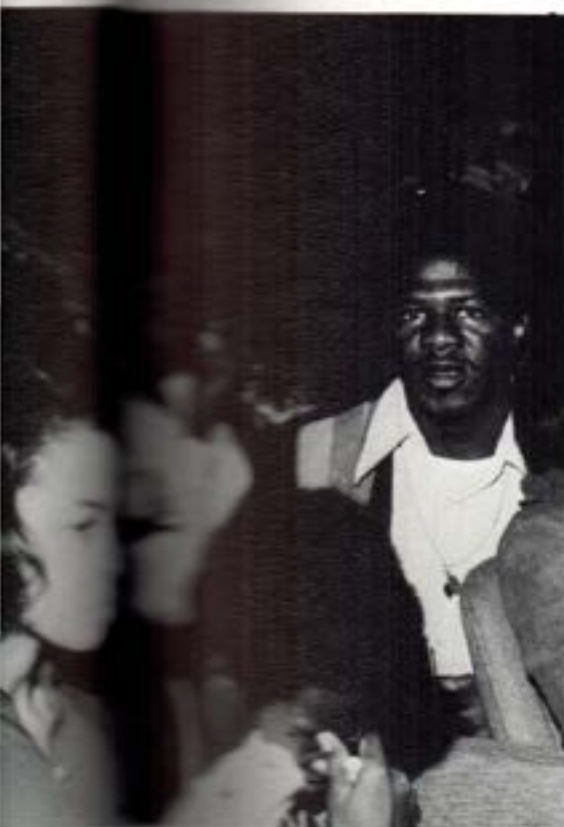

Achievements ranged from participation in club organizations to dedication on a football field. A high grade point wasn't the only requirement for admission in "Who's Who".



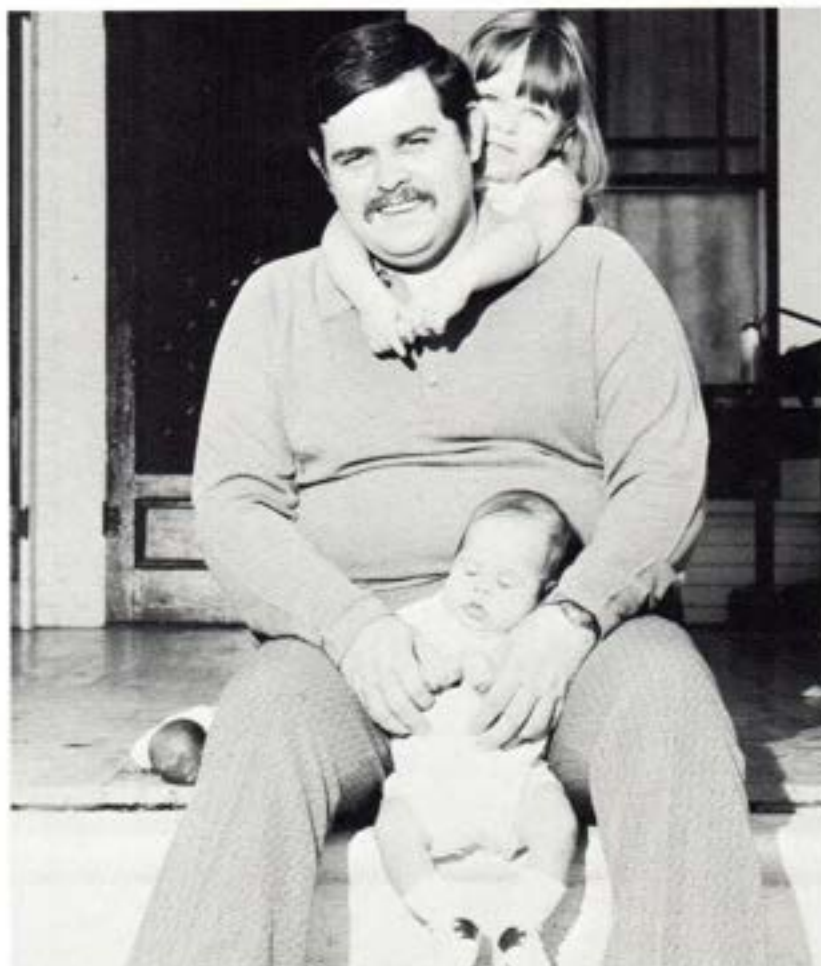

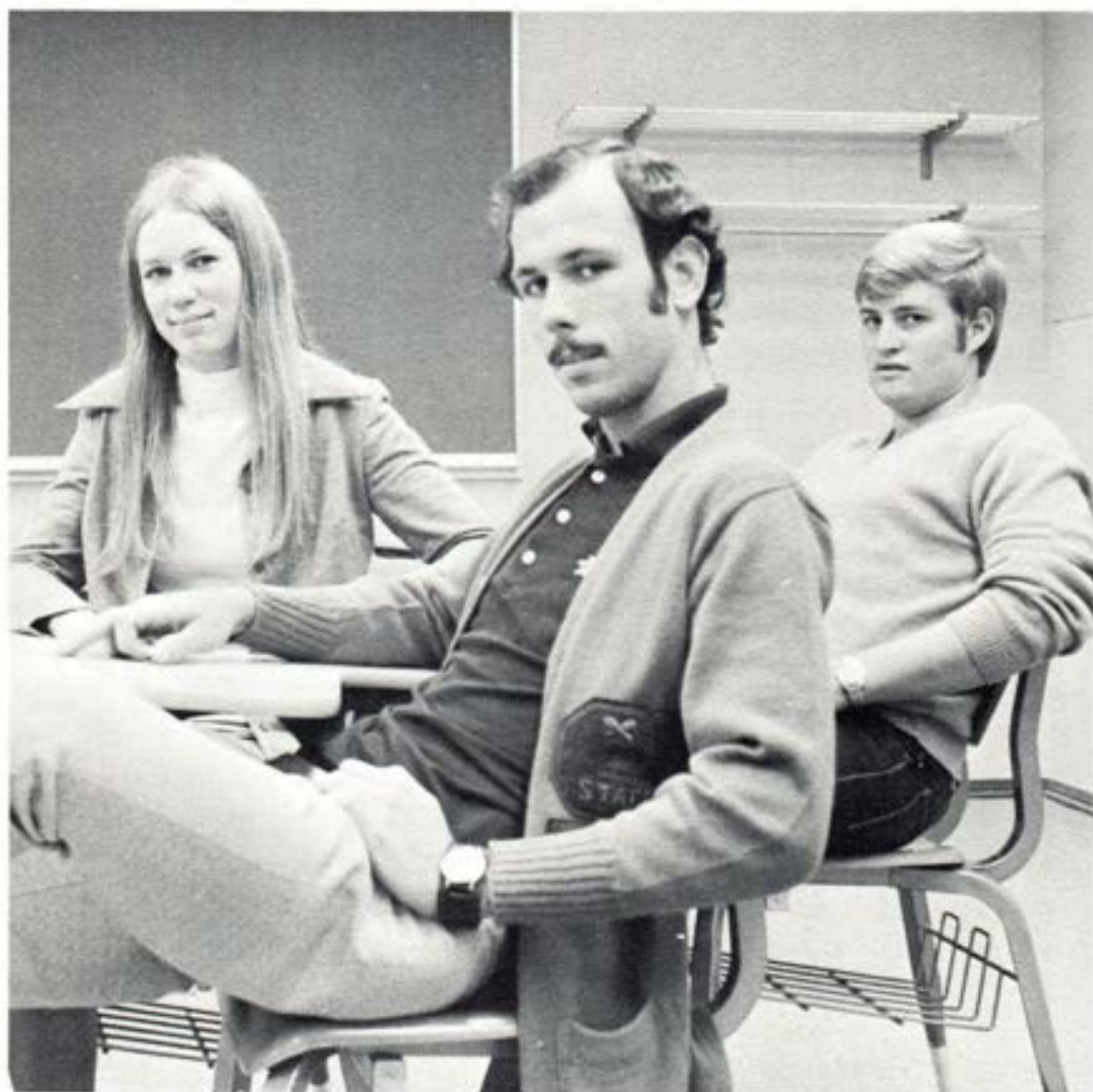

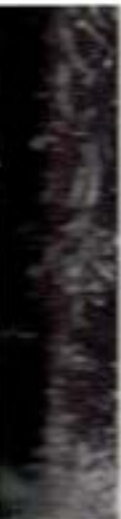

Livingston Tigers Make Come-Back, Defeat Mules

Before the half was over Southern State had scored again; this time on an eight yard pass from Lamb to Williams. Neely kicked the extra point making the half time score SSC 21, Livingston 4. Livingston rallied in the final half, though, to hand the Riders their first defeat of the season.

The Muleriders went back to their winning ways by chalking up a big 34-21 win over the Choctaws of Mississippi College. A rain-soaked field didn't hamper the Riders running attack as they picked up 289 yards, nor did it hurt the Mule defense as they held the leading Choctaw runner to a miserable 27 yards.

Phil Brooks came across with the first big score of the night when he carried the ball in from four yards out. Doug Neely added the extra point making the score 7-0 in favor of SSC. The Choctaws got on the board when Quarterback Dennis Wilson hit Ricky Herzog with a short pass and Herzog then out ran the defense for 95 yards and the

touchdown.

The Muleriders led by a powerful backfield and stubborn defense, dominated the entire game and came up with a 14-7 win over the Savages.

Southeastern drew first blood late in the second quarter when a Savage defensive lineman picked up a Rider fumble at the 50 yard line and managed to make it to the goal line before the Riders could recover. The extra point was good making the score 7-0.

The Mules came right back with a touchdown of their own. Led by the rushing of Cleo House and Floyd Canady, the Riders drove to the one yard line before Phil Brooks carried it in. QB Steve Lamb and Williams both turned in long runs before Lamb sneaked across to end the half with the Riders on top 20-7.

Roy McLemore scored early in the second half and Neely kicked the PAT upping the fourth quarter to end the Rider scoring at 34 after Neely kicked the extra point.

The Riders regained possession shortly thereafter. Cleo House made his first touchdown of the night by blasting in from nine yards out.

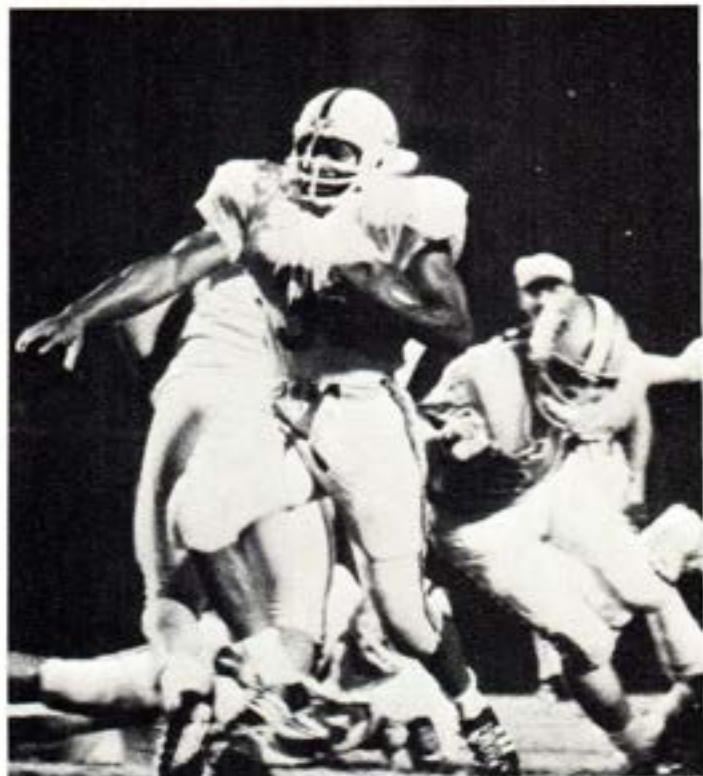

The Rider defense, led by Glenn Bucy, Steve Waller, Max Adcox, and Earl Green, put pressure on the Reddies and stopped several of their drives. SSC tied the score in the second period when quarterback Steve Lamb hit Doug Neely with a perfect 36-yard pass. Mike Rubinski added the point after. The Rider offense got moving in the second half as Cleo House capped a drive with a 10-yard dive of his own and put Southern State ahead 13-7. The Riders scored again in the third quarter on a three-yard plunge by Roy McLemore.

Floyd Canady put the Muleriders ahead to stay when he, with the help of the offensive line, scored two TD's in the final quarter. Rubinski kicked the extra point on the final touchdown to give the Riders a 32-14 victory.





Muleriders Retaliate, Run Wild; Stomp Tigers

Harding Ruins Homecoming, Nips SSC 14-9

Held to only seven points in the first half, Southern State ran wild in the third quarter to stomp Ouachita Baptist 35-14.

Ouachita scored first on a 35-yard run by Johnny Baker. The Muleriders retaliated with a 60-yard drive that ended with Cornell Williams going over from the one-yard line.

Mike Rubinski added the extra point. Then Ouachita scored their final TD on a 70-yard pass to David Crowley. In the second half

the Rider defense stopped Ouachita cold as the offense scored four touchdowns in the third period.

Cleo House bulled his way into the end zone with the first score and Rubinski split the uprights to tie the score 14-14. Less than two minutes later, Williams took a pitchout around the left and went twenty yards for the score. Next, with 2:25 left in the third quarter House climaxed a 59-yard drive when he dived over from the one for his second touchdown of the night.

The Riders were not through scoring, however, until Roy McLemore scored on a three-yard touchdown jaunt. The final score—SSC 35, OBU 14.

Harding ruined Southern State's Homecoming as they nipped the Muleriders 14-9 in an error-riddled game.

The first half was dominated by the Bison as they pushed into Rider territory time and again only to be stopped short by a stubborn Rider defense. Harding finally penetrated SSC's defense with 12 minutes left in the half when Jack Barber scrambled in for the touchdown from seven yards out. The half ended with SSC trailing 7-0. In the second half SSC put together a drive that ended with a twelve-yard touchdown run by Cornell Williams. Mike Rubinski booted the extra point to knot the game at seven all.

Following an SSC fumble Alan Dixon dragged himself into the end zone from two yards out and put Harding ahead to stay. Welch once again kicked the PAT. In the fourth quarter with two minutes showing on the clock, the Muleriders suffered their biggest setback of the game. On a third down situation at the 18-inch line a Rider fumble gave the ball to Harding. But the Rider defense, undaunted by this turn of bad luck, tackled Bison quarterback Tom Gooden in the end zone for a safety and two points. The score ended at 14-9.

Riders Defeat UAM, Secure AIC Crown



The Muleriders had little trouble with the Wonder Boys as they scored first on a five-yard touchdown pass from QB Steve Lamb to Floyd Canady.

SSC scored again in the third quarter, when linebacker Gaylon Garrison intercepted a Tech pass, thus setting up a one-yard touchdown dive by Roy McLemore. The defense set up yet another TD when Max Adcox pounced on a Tech fumble at the Tech six-yard line. Moments later McLemore slammed in for his second tally of the game. The two-point conversion was good as Lamb hit Eddie Choate in the end zone with a pass. Tech scored when they were stopped short on a drive and had to settle for a field goal in the second quarter.

Under the leadership of Coach Rip Powell, Southern State College captured their first AIC conference championship in twenty years with a 43-0 victory over the University of Arkansas at Monticello.

The Muleriders began their attack in the first quarter when Floyd Canady capped a 70-yard drive by diving over from the two. Cleo House added six more points on to SSC's 7-0 score when he bulled his way in from one yard out. 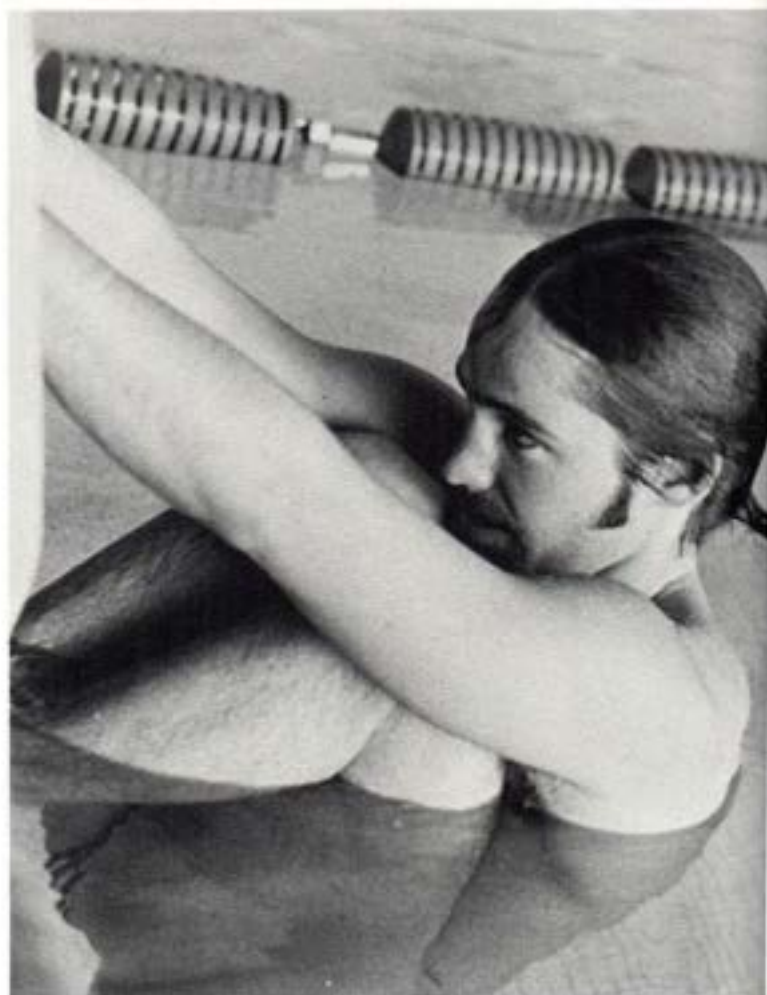

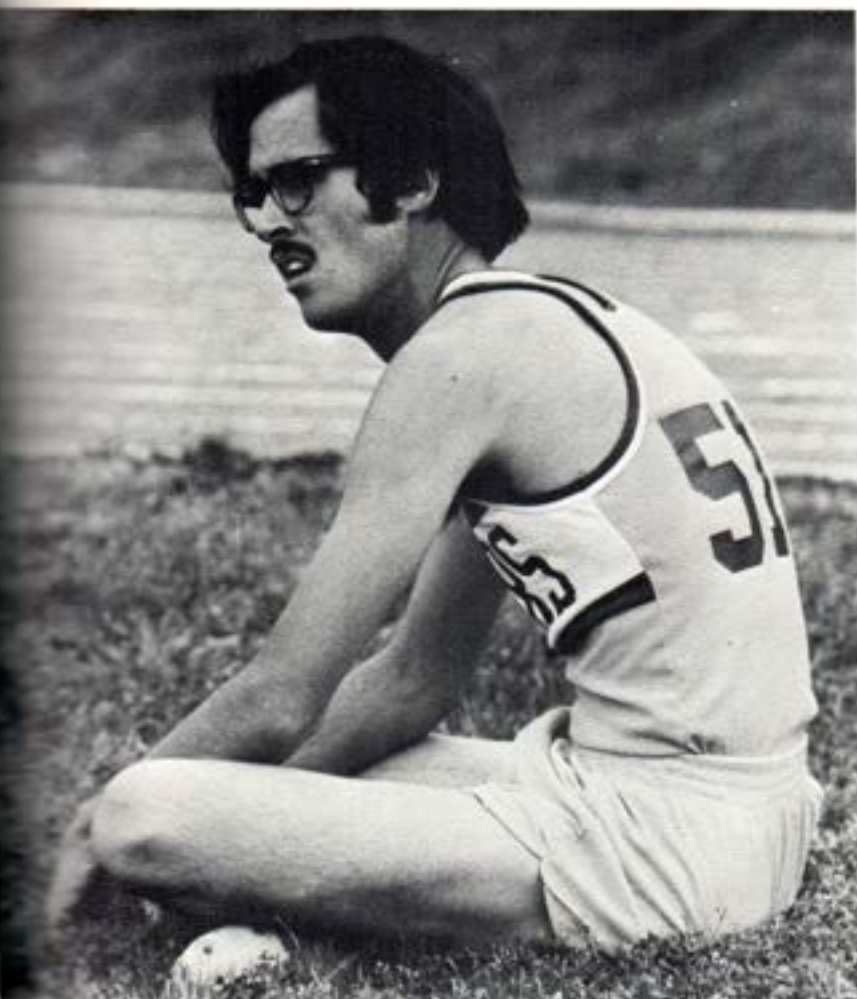

BSU Creates "Over Supper Dialogs"; Students Have Concert, Travel To Retreat

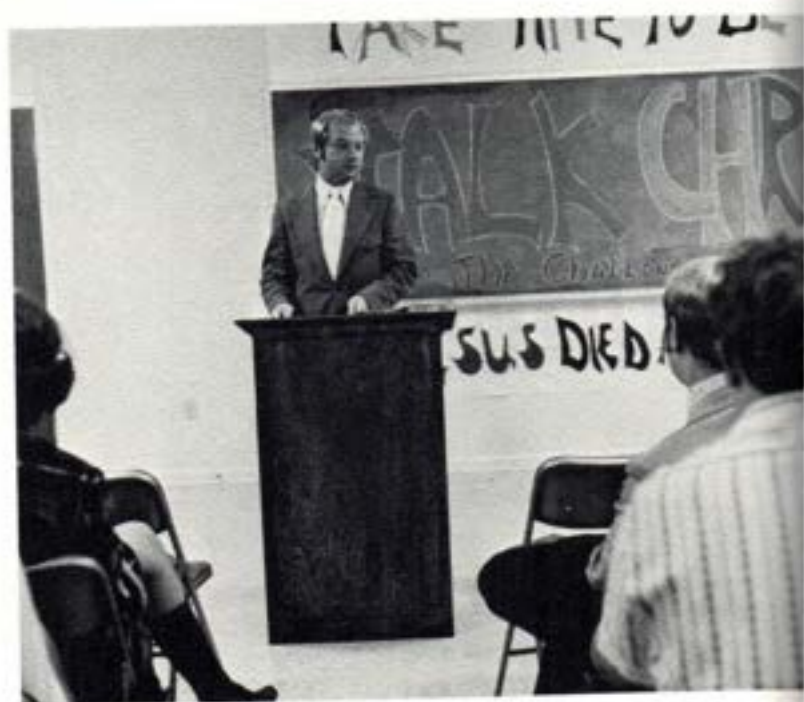

Occupational speakers spoke regularly. These speakers discussed their particular agricultural fields.

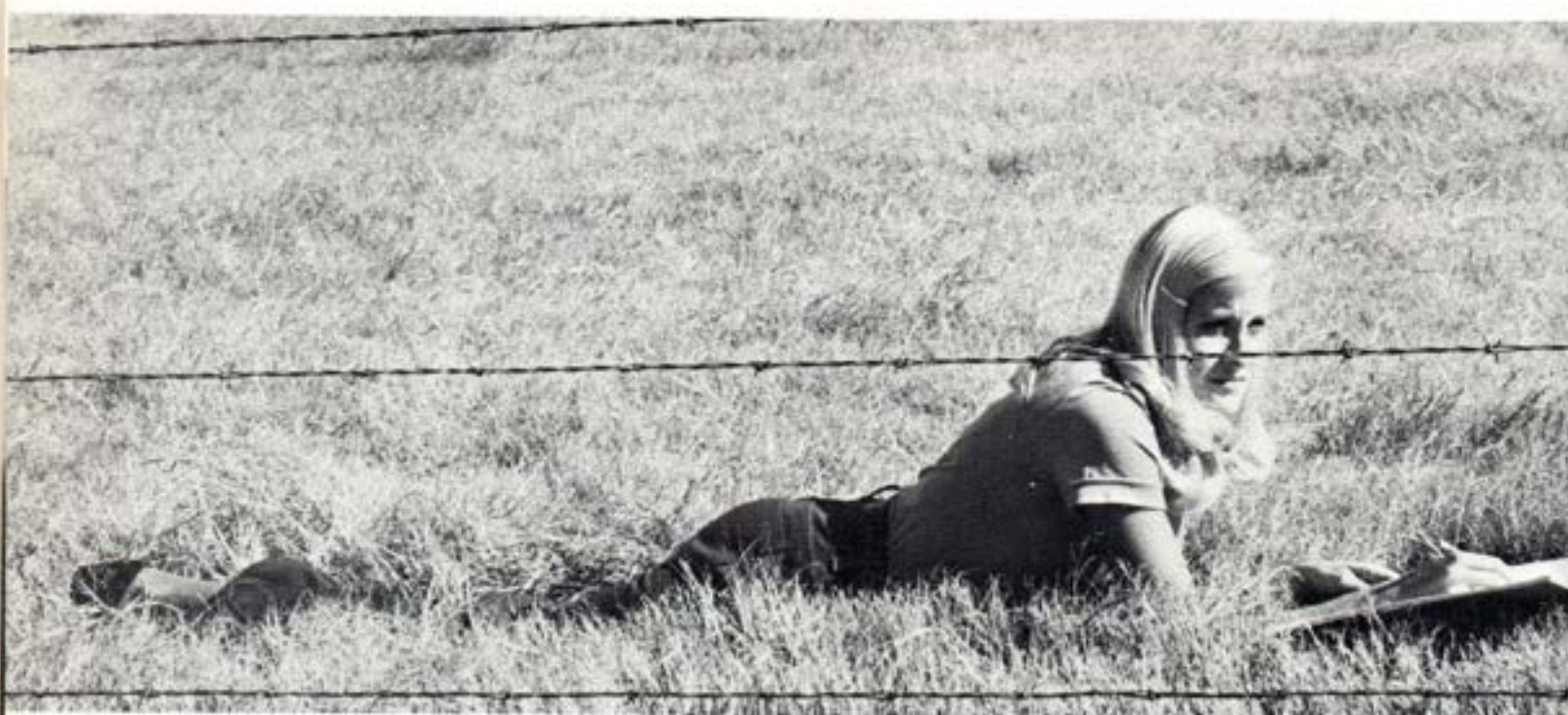
They were invited in order to give the club members a good cross section of views held by different men or farm organizations. They included Dr. Runyan Deere, Mike Vines, and Jack Davis.

The Choral Society performed at the United Methodist Church. The Concert Choir sang at a special Magnolia Chamber of Commerce program and at an SSC recital.

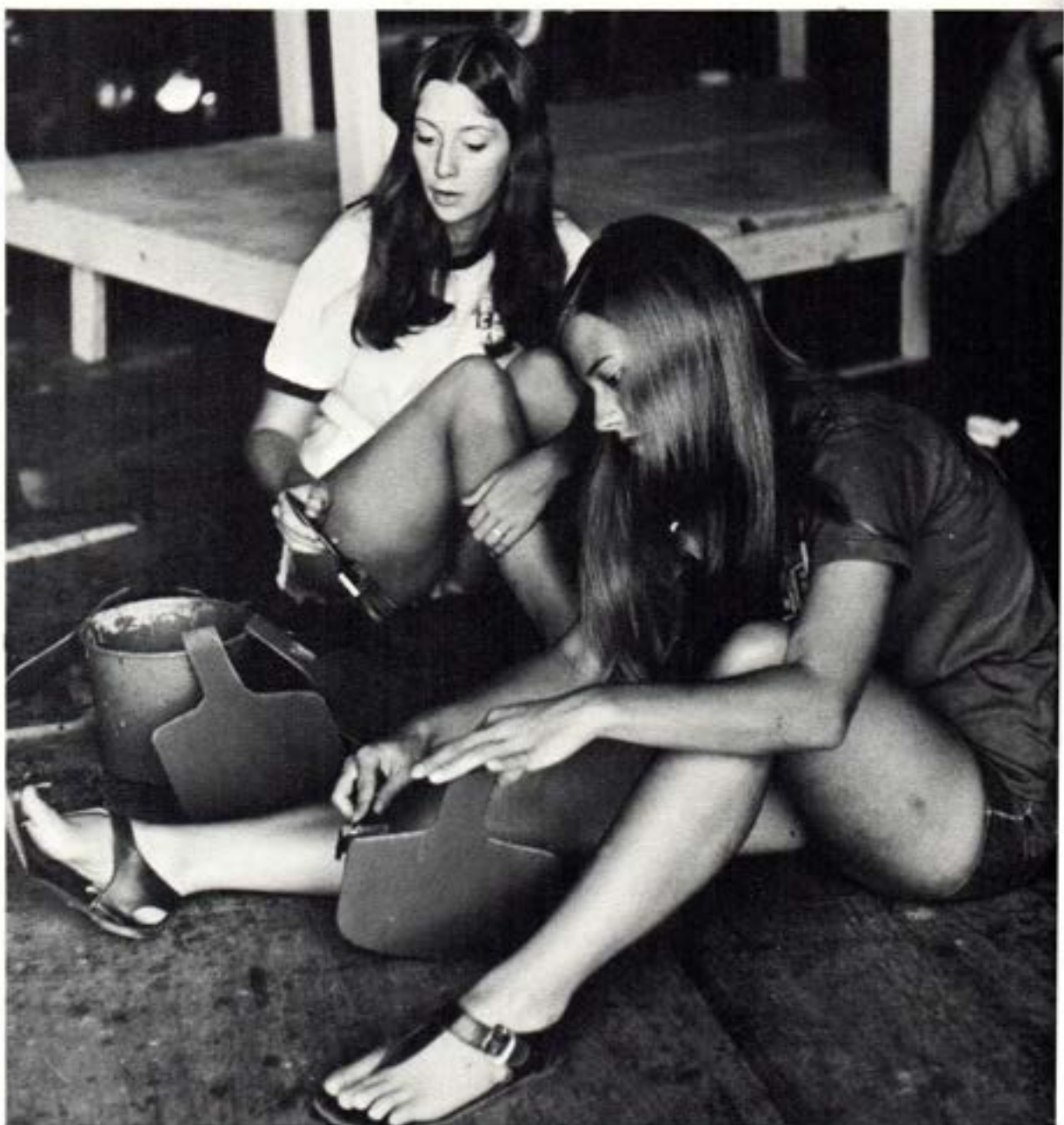
Second semester, the choir visited several Arkansas cities for their annual concert tour.

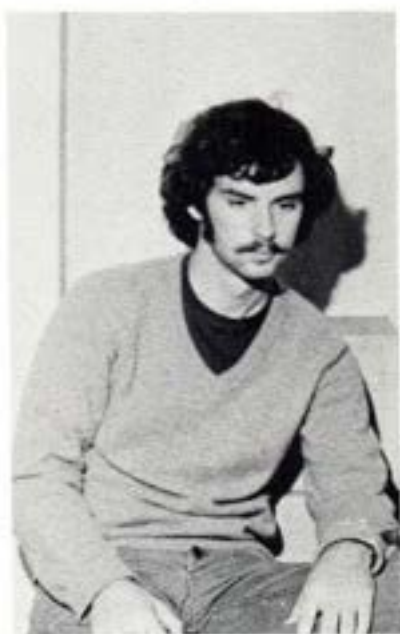
Staff Enlarges Size, Adds Full-Time Dark Room Man
