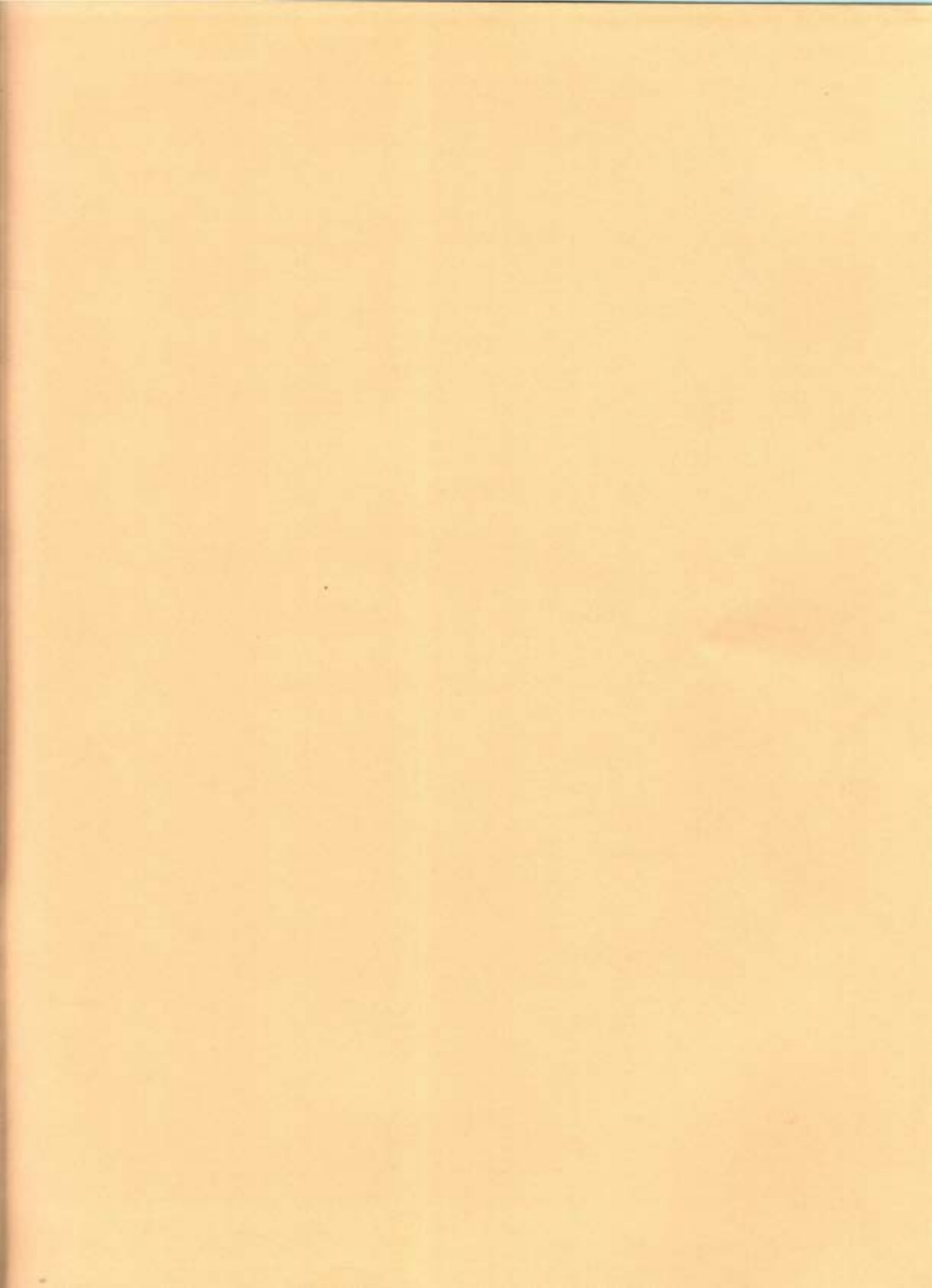




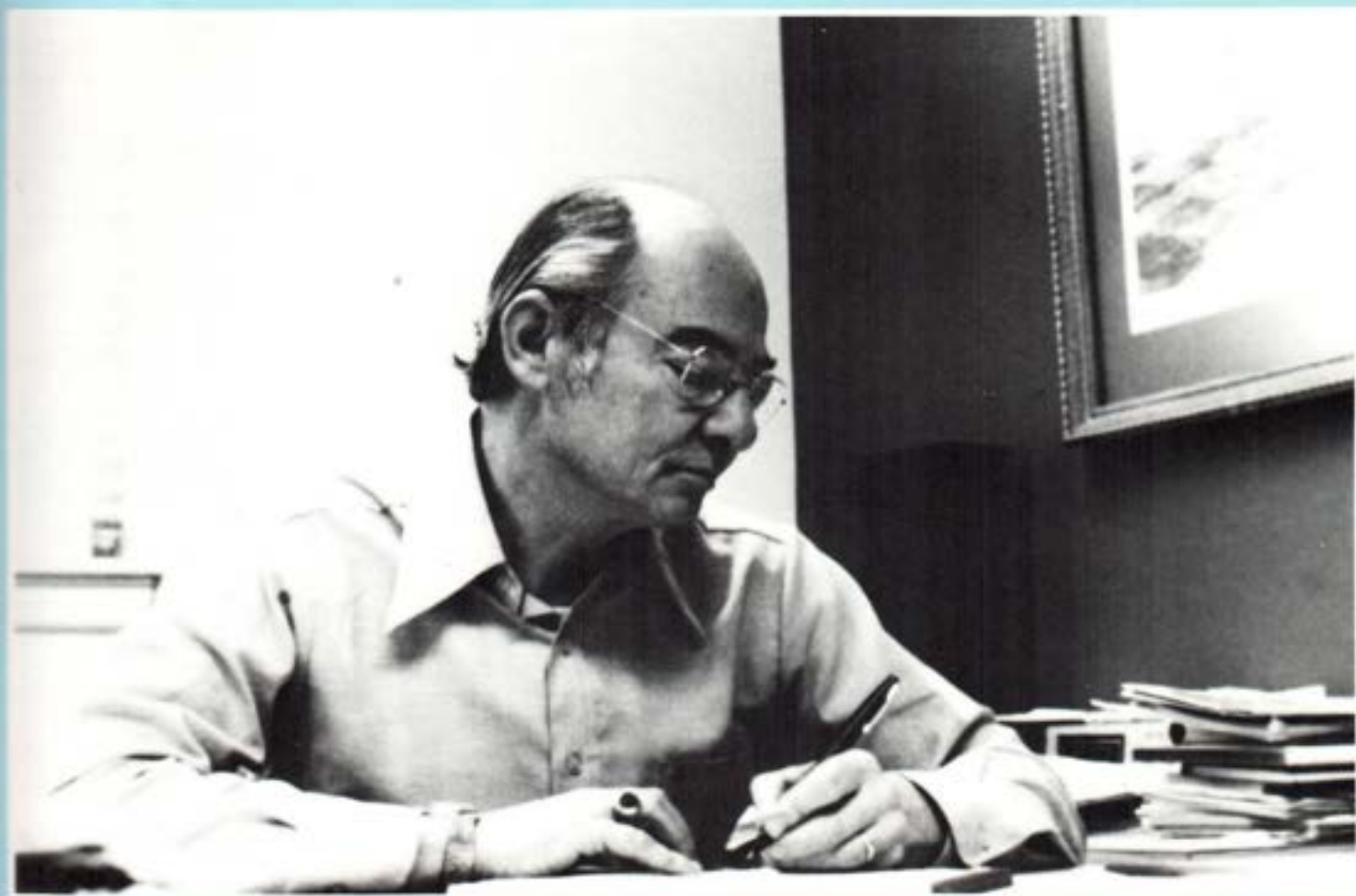

Dr. Albert Stecker, Professor of Management and Computer Science, is originally from Englewood, New Jersey, and a graduate of Leonia, N.J., High School.

He earned the B.S.E.E. degree from Purdue University, the M.B.A. from Rutgers, and the D.B.A. from Indiana University in Bloomington.

He served as second in command and navigator of a Navy mine-sweeping vessel called the U.S.S. Heed off the coast of Korea.

Also an electrical engineer, Stecker worked as Chief Test Engineer for the International Telephone and Telegraph Company (ITT) for 13 years. He then

moved to Camden as general manager of the Arkansas Division of ITT.

Stecker joined the SAU faculty in 1965, two years after his move to Camden.

"I had learned a great deal about electronics, business, and computer science while working for ITT, so I was hired by SAU," Stecker said.

According to Dr. David Rankin, dean of the school of business administration 1976-79, "Dr. Stecker has a superior ability to communicate with students. He is regarded as one of the most outstanding business instructors in Arkansas."

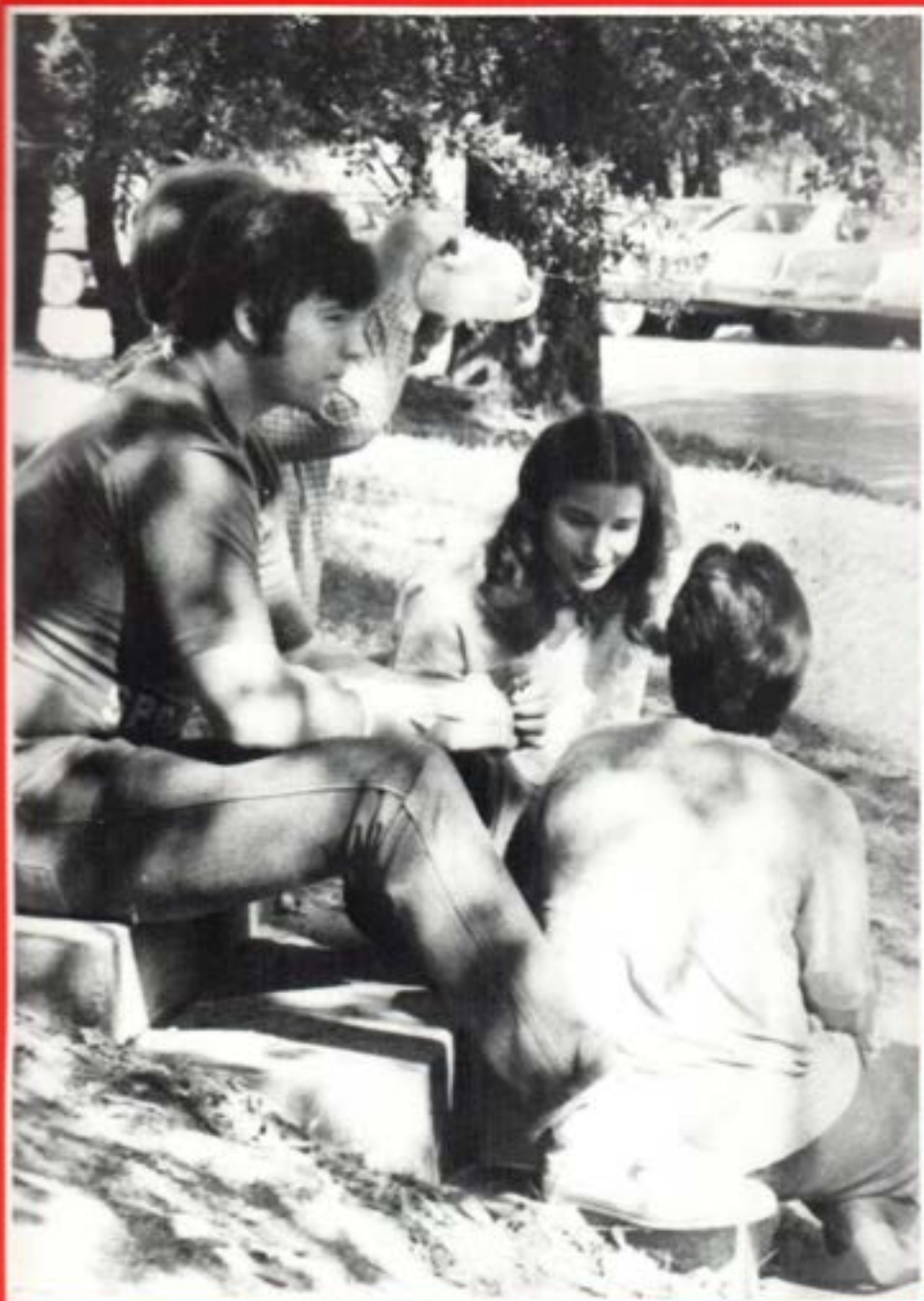
Dr. Stecker has also taught a Sunday

School Class at the First Presbyterian Church in Camden. His Sunday afternoon time is spent gardening, a favorite hobby.

He also travels to Cape Cod every summer where he "works diligently at doing nothing."

Stecker's daughters, Claudia and Andrea, are students at SAU. Julie, his wife and walking companion, has "a very big job" as housewife and mother, according to Stecker.

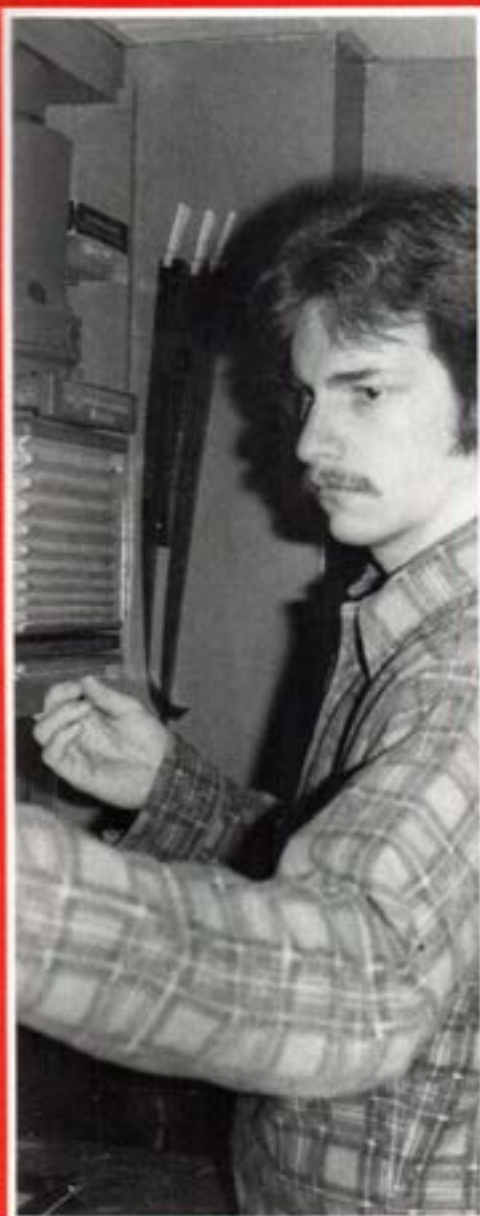

Dr. Harold T. Brinson

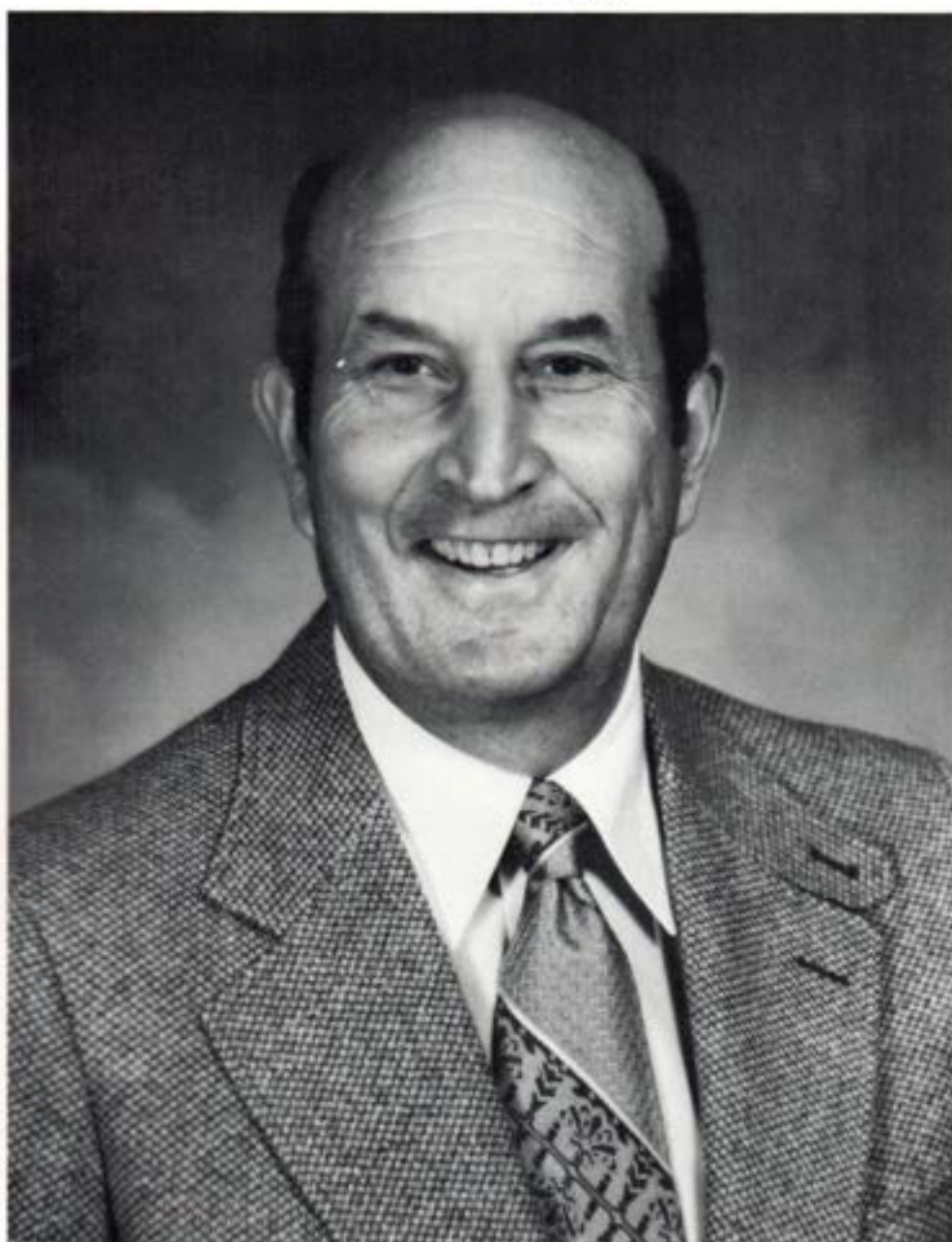
Dr. Harold T. Brinson served his fifth year as president of Southern Arkansas University during 1980-81. Dr. Brinson is SAU's ninth president.

Dr. Brinson was Superintendent of Schools in the Abilene Independent School District prior to taking over the SAU post. Before becoming superintendent of the Abilene School, he was Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Services in that district, a Training Consultant for the University of Texas at Austin, Assistant to the Superintendent at North East Independent School District, San Antonio, Texas, and was Assistant Principal at Abilene High School. His first full-time jobs, after serving in the Marine Corps from 1951 to 1953, were as coach, science and health teacher at Levelland High School, Levelland, Texas, and at Abilene High School.

He was born in Harper Springs, Arkansas. He attended DeQueen High School, Magnolia A & M (now SAU), and received his B.Ed. from Tulane University in 1951. His M. Ed. and Ph.D. degrees are from the University of Texas at Austin. Additional training has been at Texas Tech, Hardin-Simmons, Texas Christian University, and the National Academy for School Executives.

Professional memberships held by Dr. Brinson include: Phi Delta Kappa, American Association of School Administrators, National Congress of Parents and Teachers, and the Marine Corps Reserve Officers Association.

In 1978, Dr. Brinson and his wife, Gene, were part of a delegation who participated in a 10-day cultural exchange mission to Taiwan. The trip was an effort to strengthen educational and cultural ties between the U.S. and Taiwan.

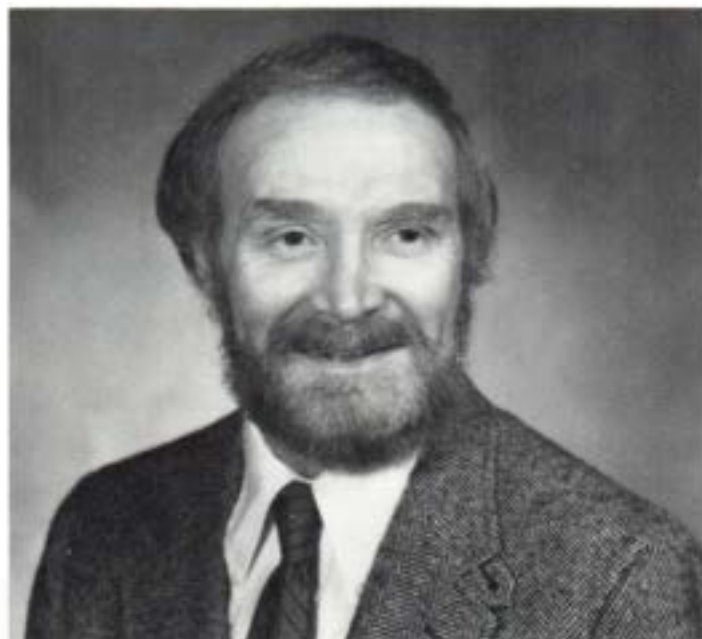




While a student at Magnolia A & M, Dr. Brinson was a member of the Mulerider football and basketball teams. He then enrolled in Tulane University where he played two years for the Green Wave and in 1950-51 won the annual athletic award "Most Unselfish and Best Spirited Athlete."

Dr. Brinson said that this year has really been exciting. The installation of the bells early in the year and the renovation of Overstreet Hall were satisfactory. He felt that the students this year were more serious about learning, and that they seemed to enjoy the year also. Dr. Brinson was pleased to be associated with the staff and students of Southern Arkansas University during the 1980-81 year.

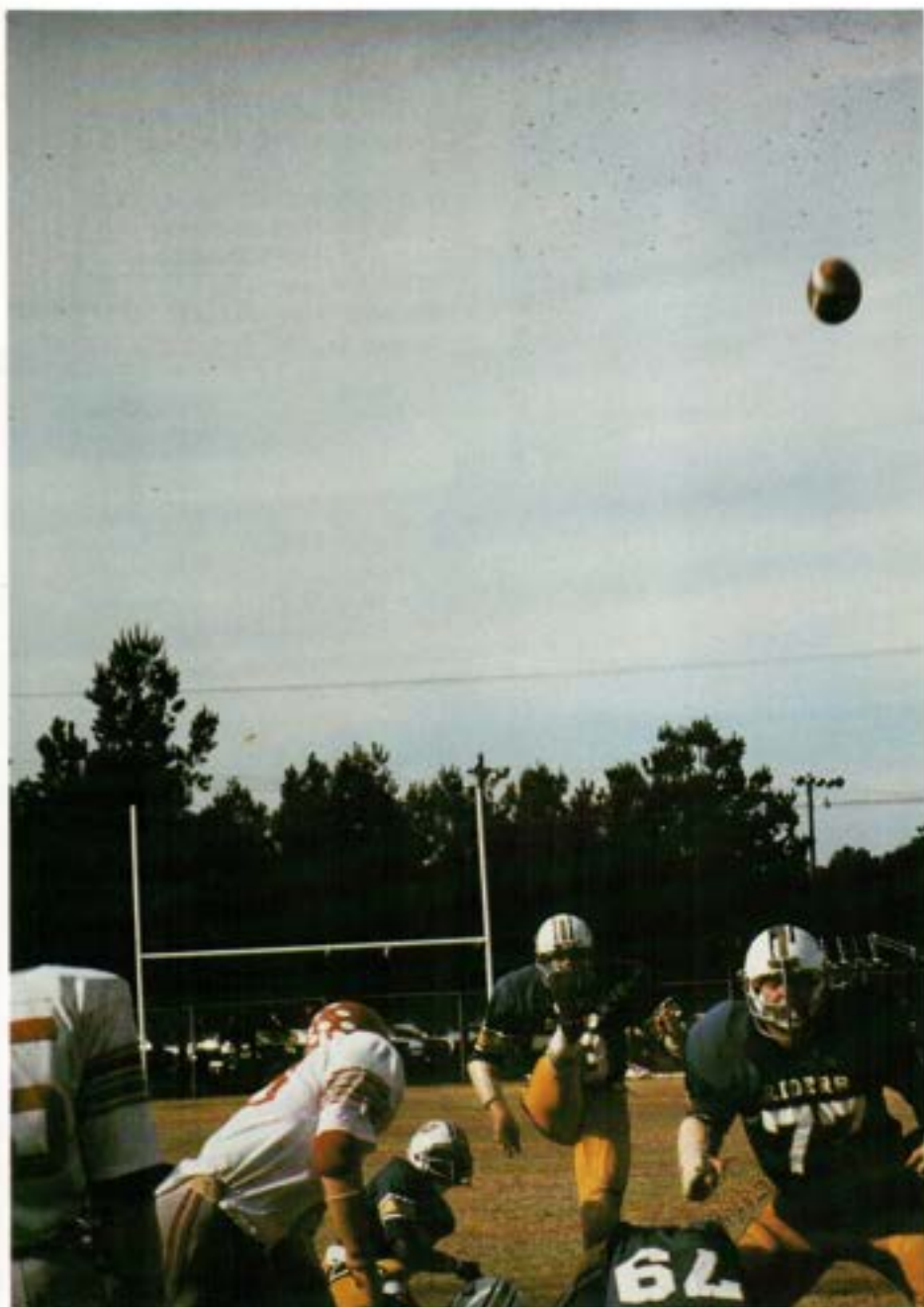

HOW I SURVIVED

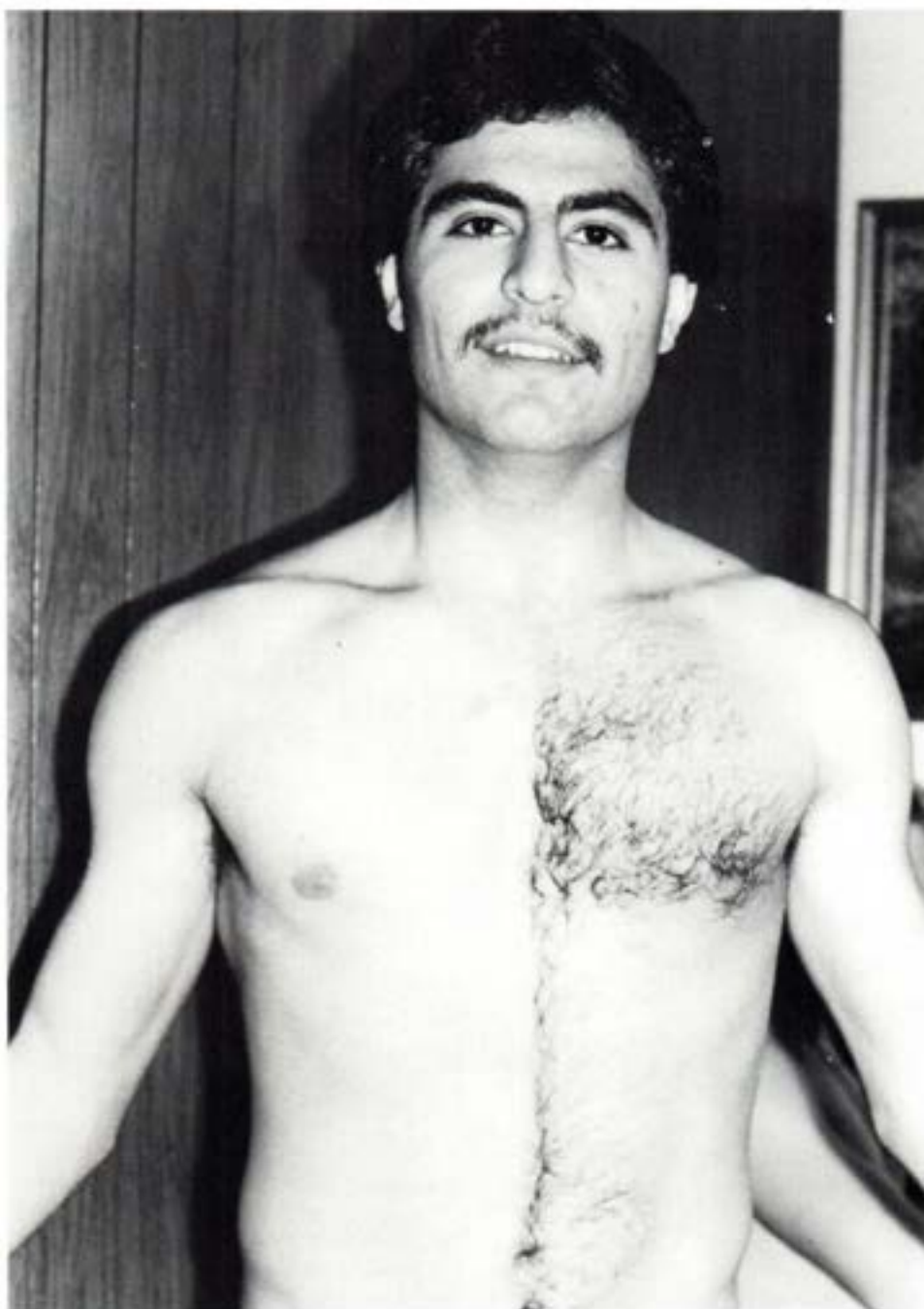
Just plain exciting . . . Darren Foreman's last second victorious shot

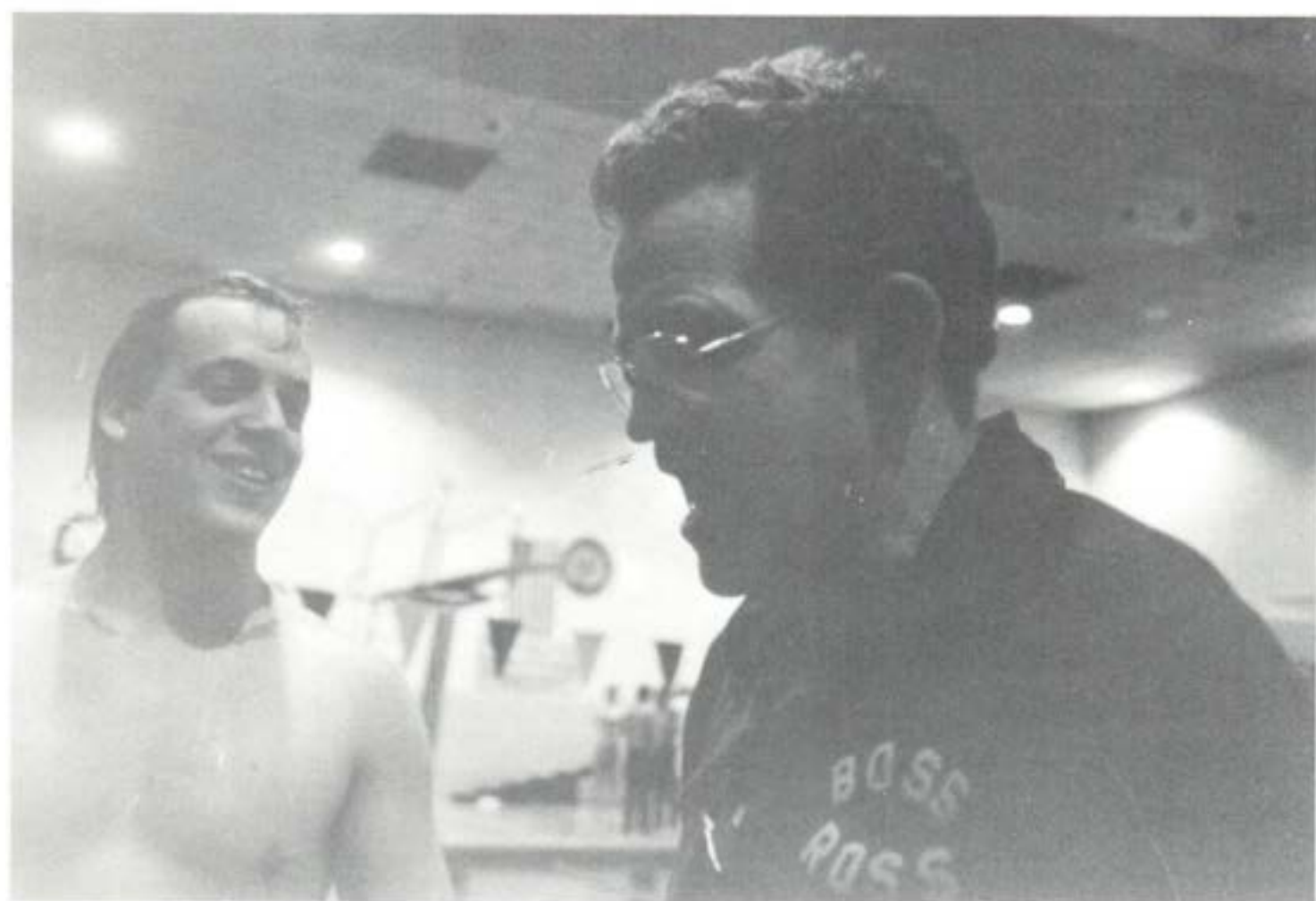
Unfortunately, the Mulerider's propensity for last second dramatics failed and they were defeated by Arkansas Tech 44 to 43.

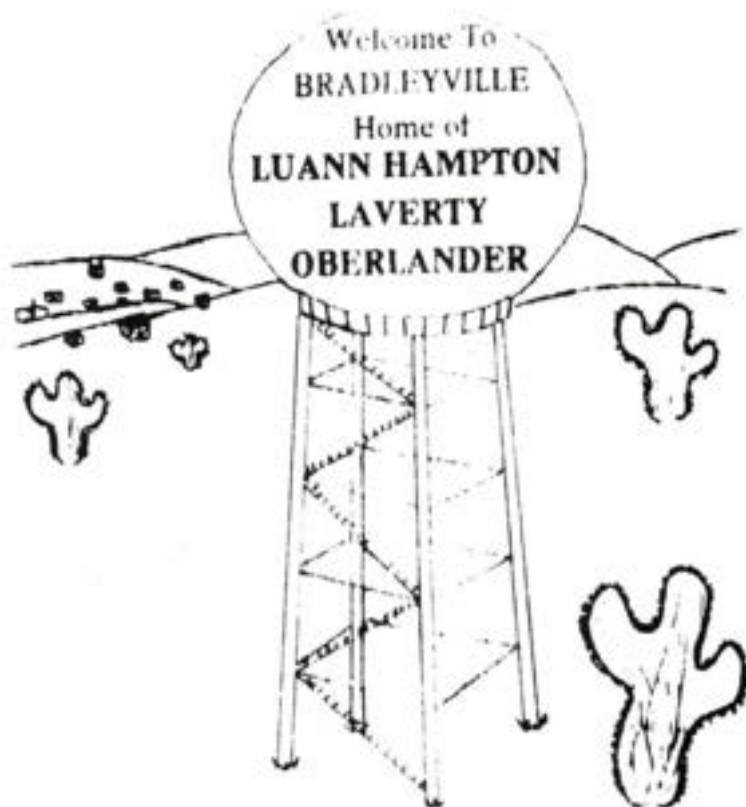

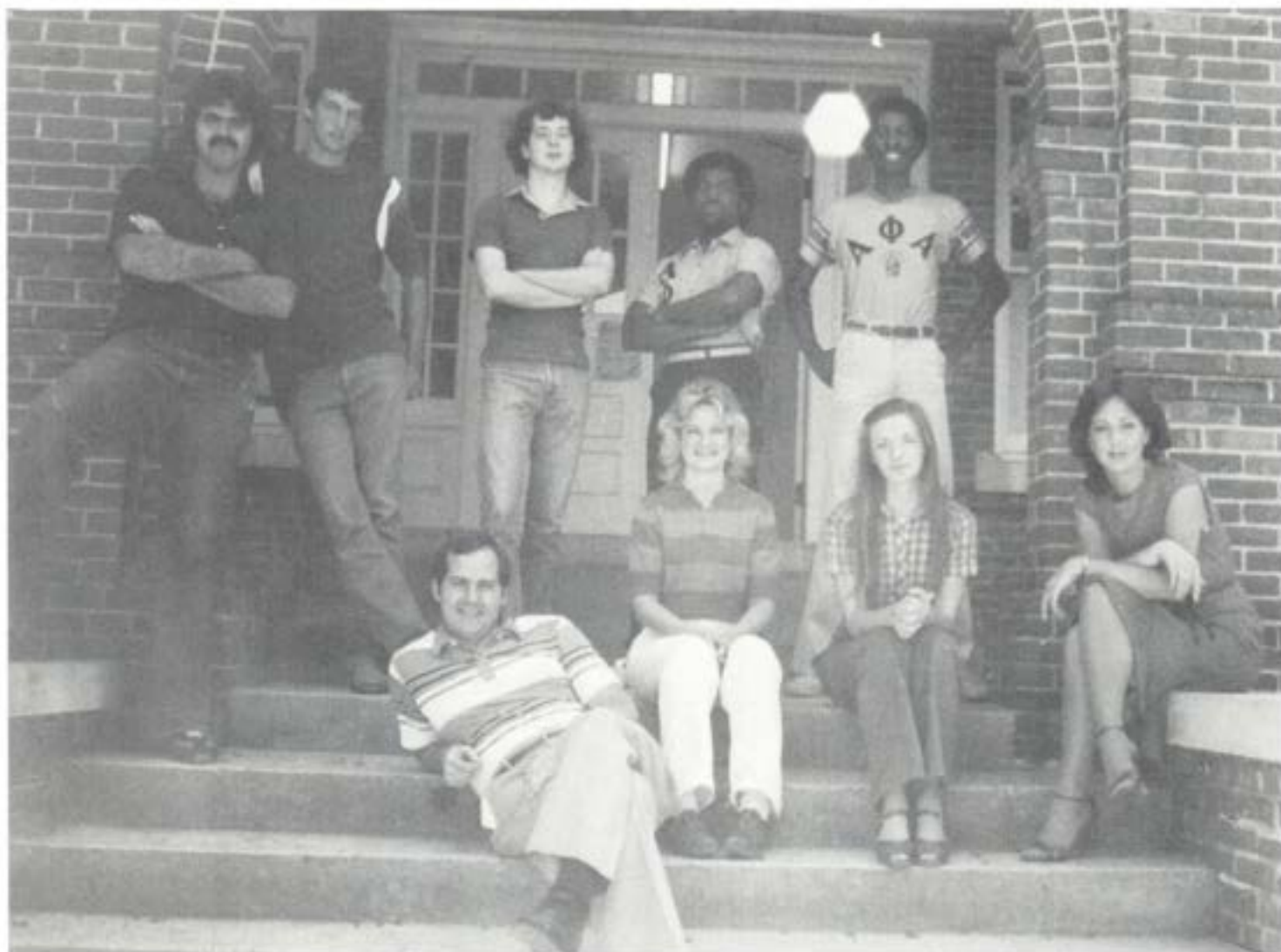

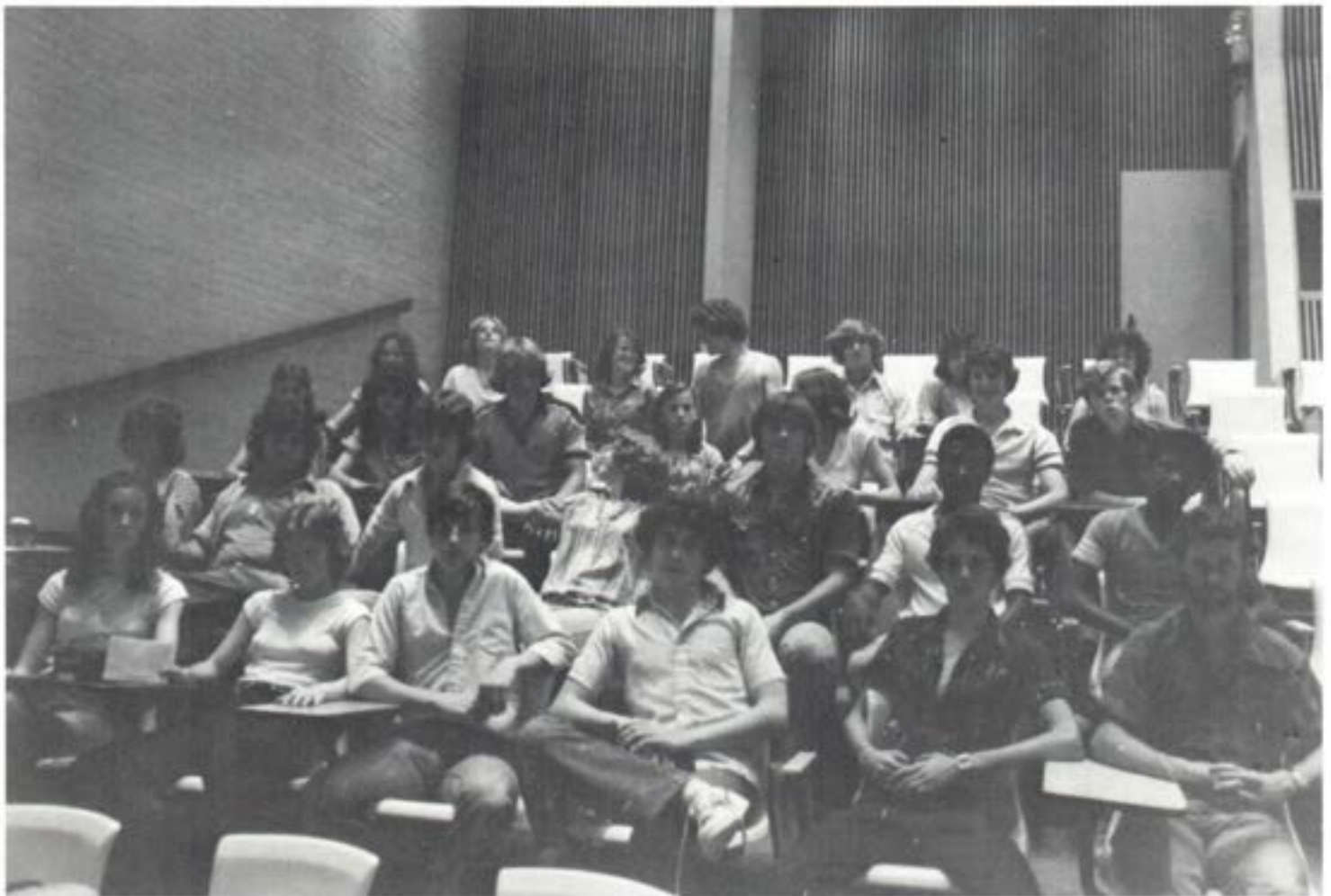

PURPOSE: To generate the skills and the motivation necessary for success in education beyond high school for youth from low-income families who have academic potential but who lack adequate secondary school preparation. For the major number of participants in the Southern Arkansas University Upward Bound Project the inadequate secondary school preparation is a result of severe rural isolation.

GOAL: To increase the academic performance and the motivational level of enrollees so that such persons may complete secondary school and successfully pursue post-secondary programs.

OBJECTIVES: To receive academic instruction and tutoring within the context of courses being studied by the student at the secondary school and/or to participate in activities such as field trips to museums, educational institutions, theaters, and movies that have as their purpose the intellectual, social and cultural development of such students and to receive individualized guidance, counseling, and orientation in career opportunities and requirements for post-secondary education including preparation of admission and financial aid.

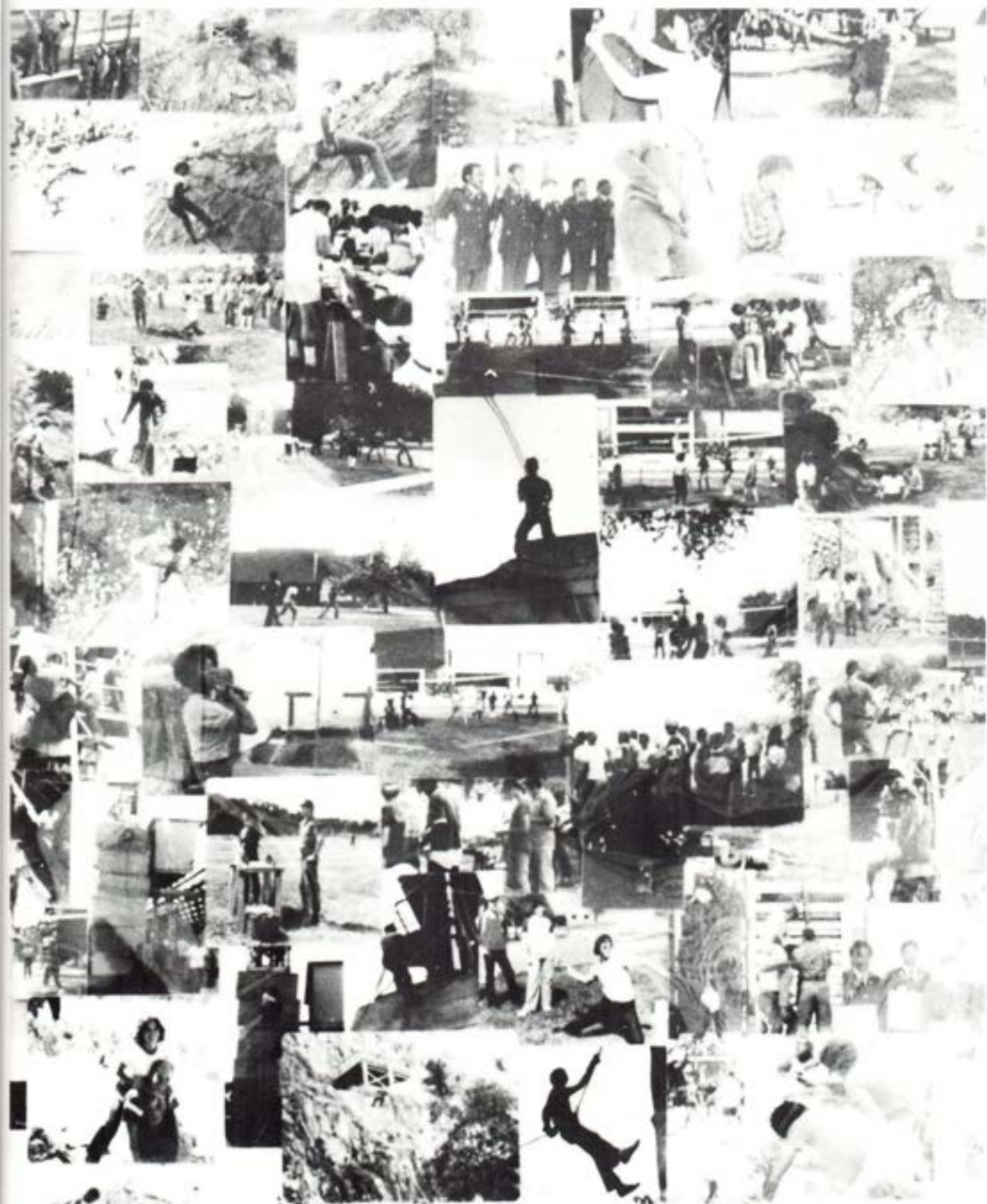
