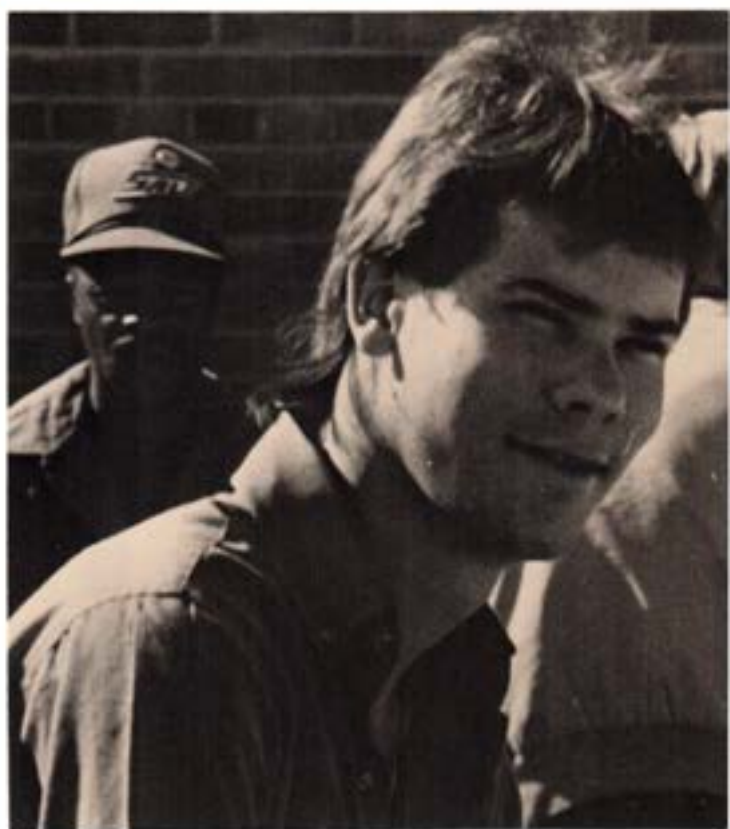


The Race Is On

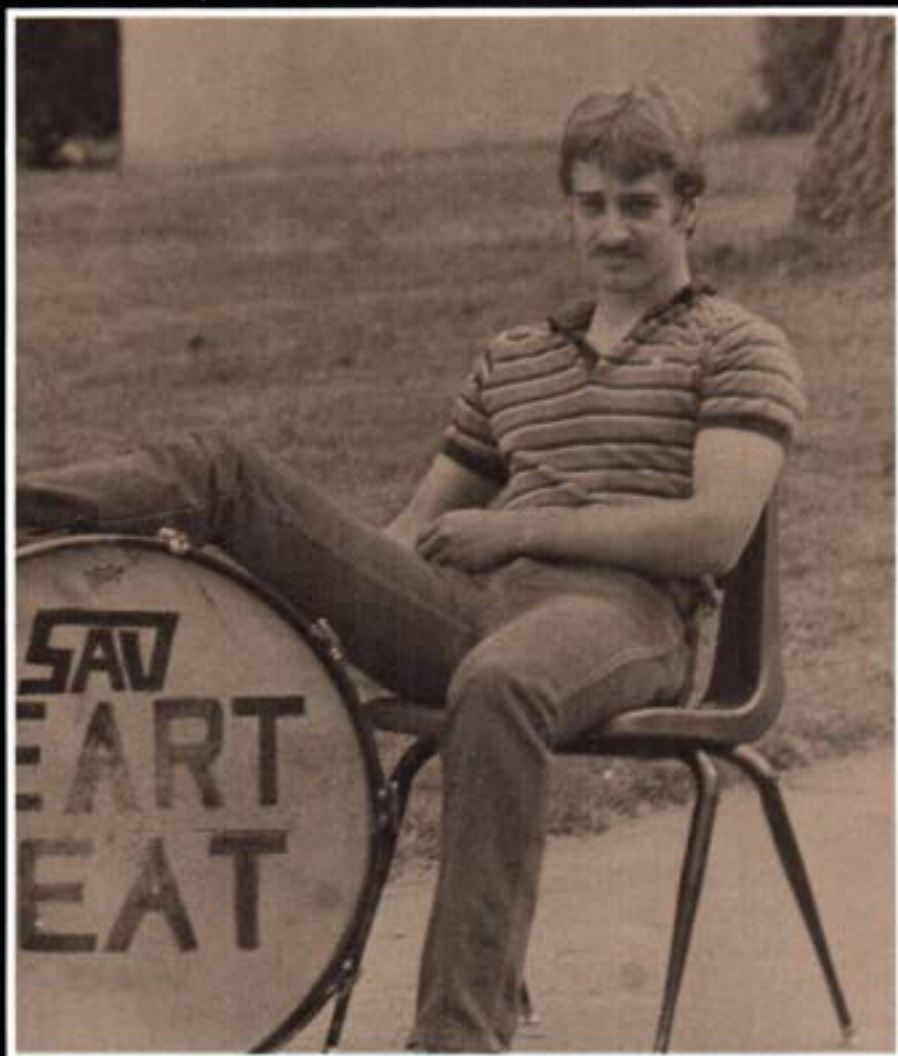

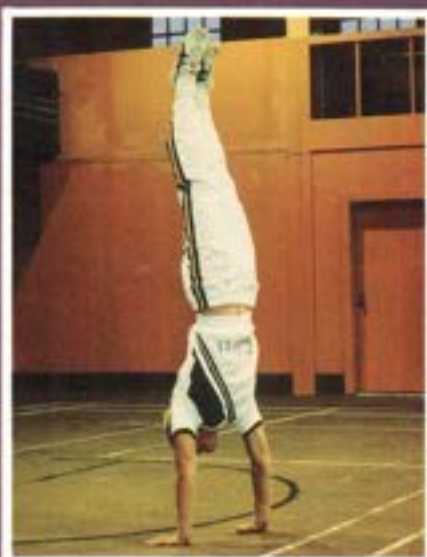

Alpha Chi Aims, Ideals, and Symbols

1. Alpha Chi is dedicated to the stimulation of a spirit of sound scholarship and devotion to the truth wherever it may be found.
2. The object of Alpha Chi is the promotion and recognition of scholarship and of those elements of character which make scholarship effective for good among the undergraduate students in the academic divisions of colleges and universities.
3. The membership pledge is: "I pledge myself to uphold the purpose of Alpha Chi. Striving to make its ideals my ideals in scholarship and in service." This promise must be memorized and repeated aloud at the induction ceremony.
4. Alpha Chi is opposed to bigotry, narrowness, and distinctions between people on any basis. Alpha Chi seeks to promote the genuine personal worth of each individual.
5. The motto of the Society is, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free," John 8:32.
6. The name "Alpha Chi" is composed of the initial letters of the Greek words *ALÉTHEIA* and *CHARAKTĒR*, meaning "Truth" and "Character."
7. The colors of the Society are sapphire blue (signifying "Truth") and emerald green (signifying "Victory").
8. The key of Alpha Chi is a shield bearing on its front a lamp and the raised initial letters of the Society. On the back appears, in small black letters, the name of the person entitled to wear the key, and above it the name or the official initials of the college or university to which he belongs. At the bottom, in raised letters, is the founding date of Alpha Chi, February 22, 1922. This key may be worn by all Active (or alumnus) and Honorary members. No members shall permit any non-member to wear it.
9. The official song of the Society is the "Alpha Chi Hymn."

The Future Farmers of America (FFA) issued Collegiate Chapter, Charter Number 000 to the Overstreet Collegiate Chapter located at A & M College, Magnolia, Arkansas on the 11th day of April, 1919. Milton B. Talley was college advisor and Charles A. Overstreet was President of A & M College at that time. Early records are scarce, and it is believed that the chapter went inactive during the World War II period.

The chapter was reactivated as the SAU Overstreet Chapter in December, 1981 with 45 "Charter Members". This was after SAU had been approved for a program for Vocational Agricultural Teacher Education in December, 1981 by the State Department of

Vocational and Technical Education. The FFA program is an integral part of secondary school education and the Collegiate Chapter helps bridge the gap for students from the time they enter the University until graduation as vocational agriculture teachers.

The chapter members assist with the Southwest District Judging contest on campus each year, assist area schools with parliamentary procedure and public speaking contests, assist at county, district and state fairs, help with Special Olympics, assist in recruiting students, and sponsor an Annual FFA Greenhand Conference on campus. The most recent endeavor has been the promotion of an FFA Wall Calendar project, sponsored by a dozen different businesses in town.

The chapter promotes the development of leadership, citizenship, character, scholarship, cooperation, service, thrift, recreation, patriotism, and improved agriculture among its members. Our motto is:

The Chapter is chartered by the Arkansas Association, Future Farmer of America, as provided by the National Constitution and Bylaws, Future Farmers of America.

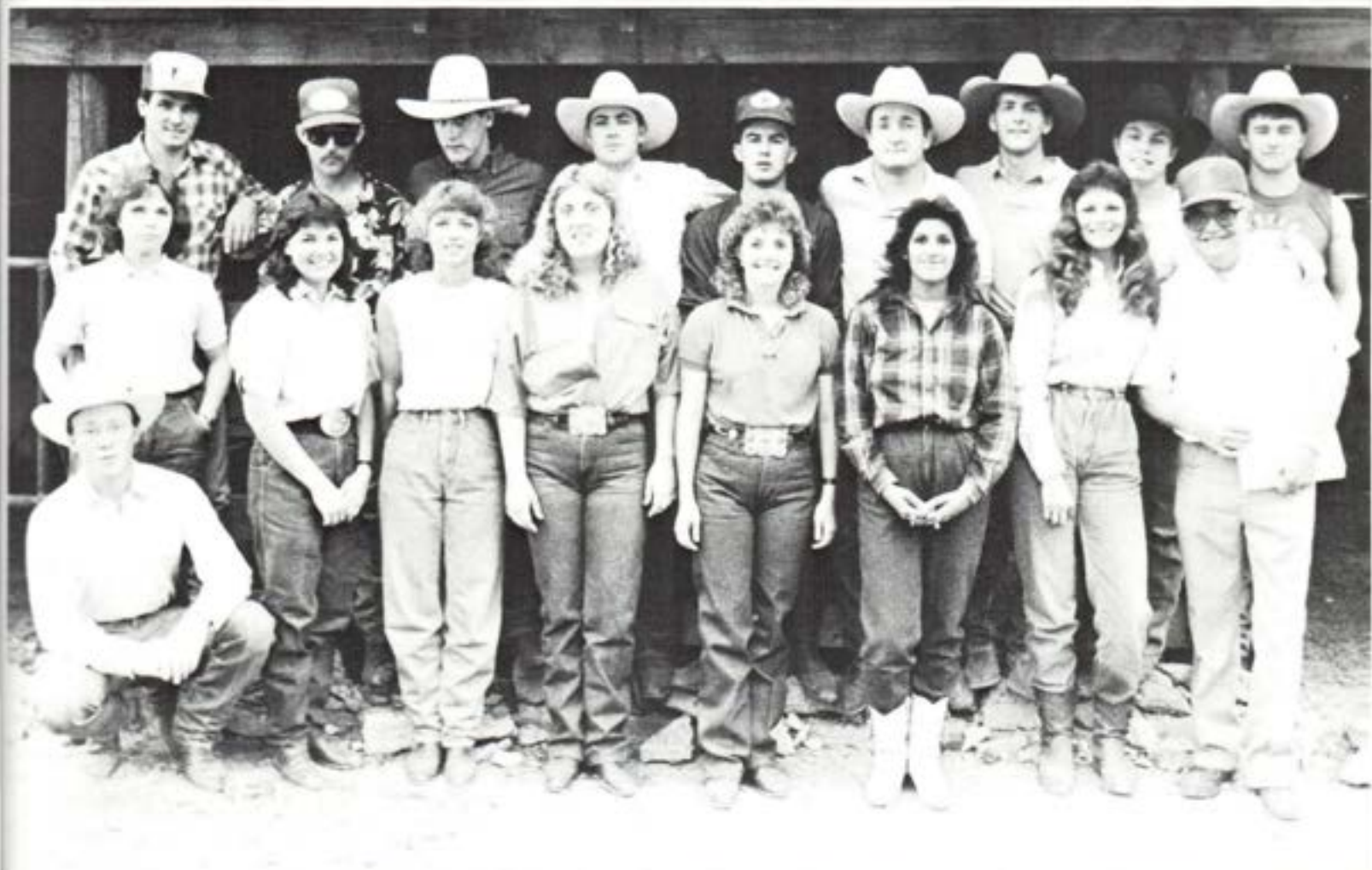

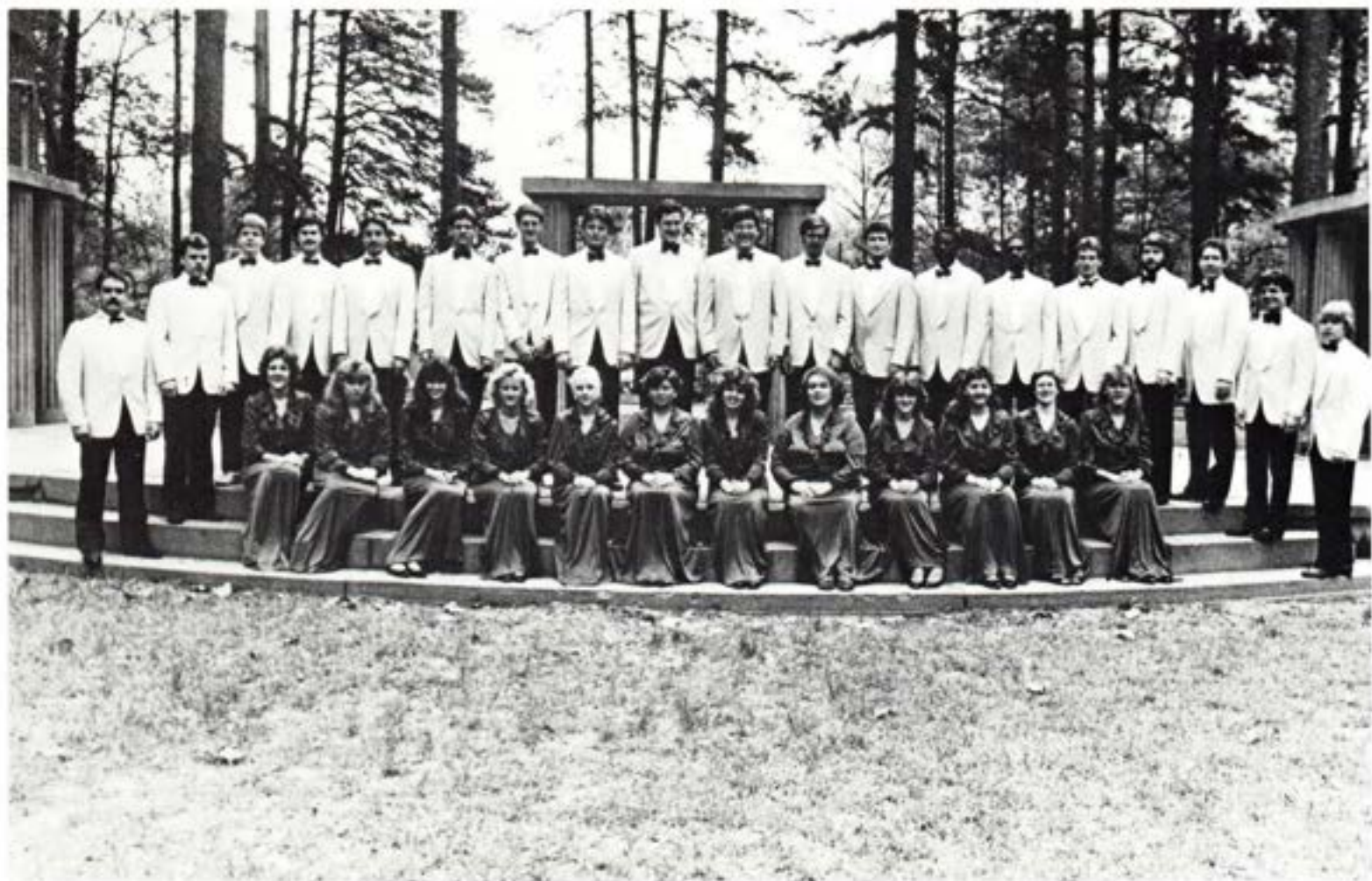

Working on the Bray has helped students realize the importance of the media, and the importance of developing communication skills.

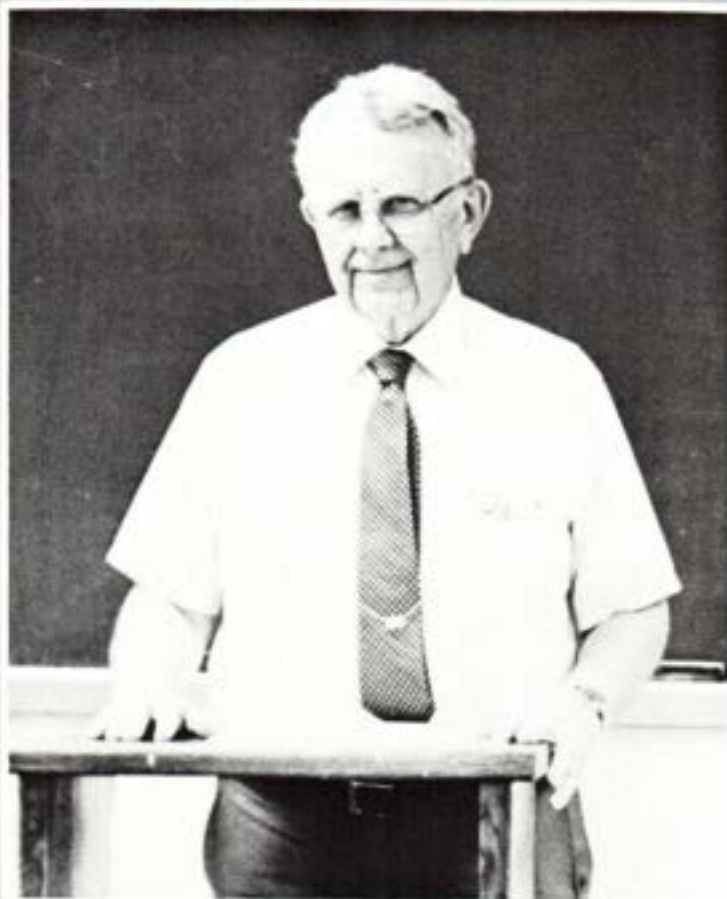
Political Affairs

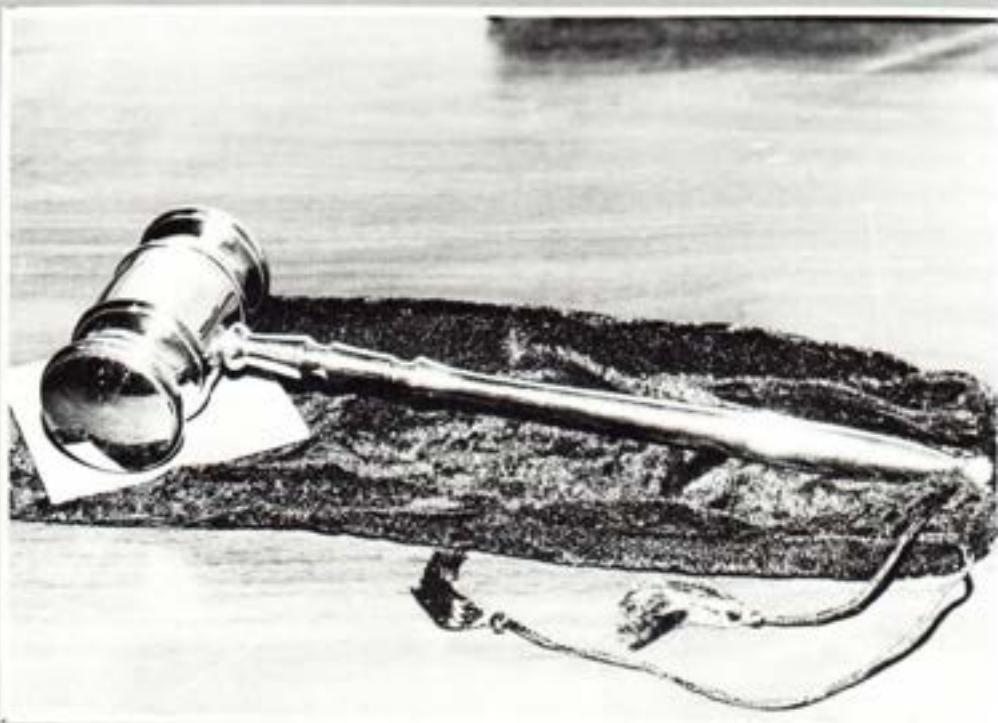

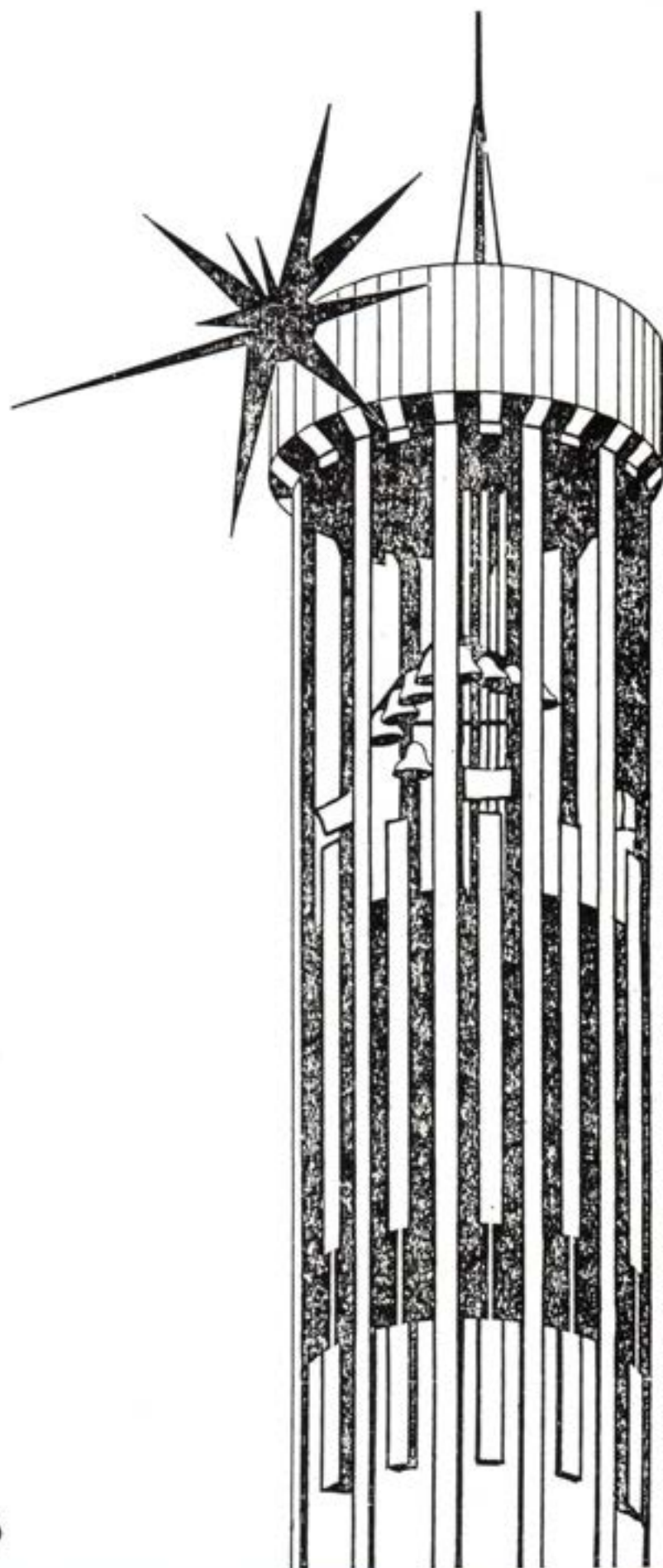

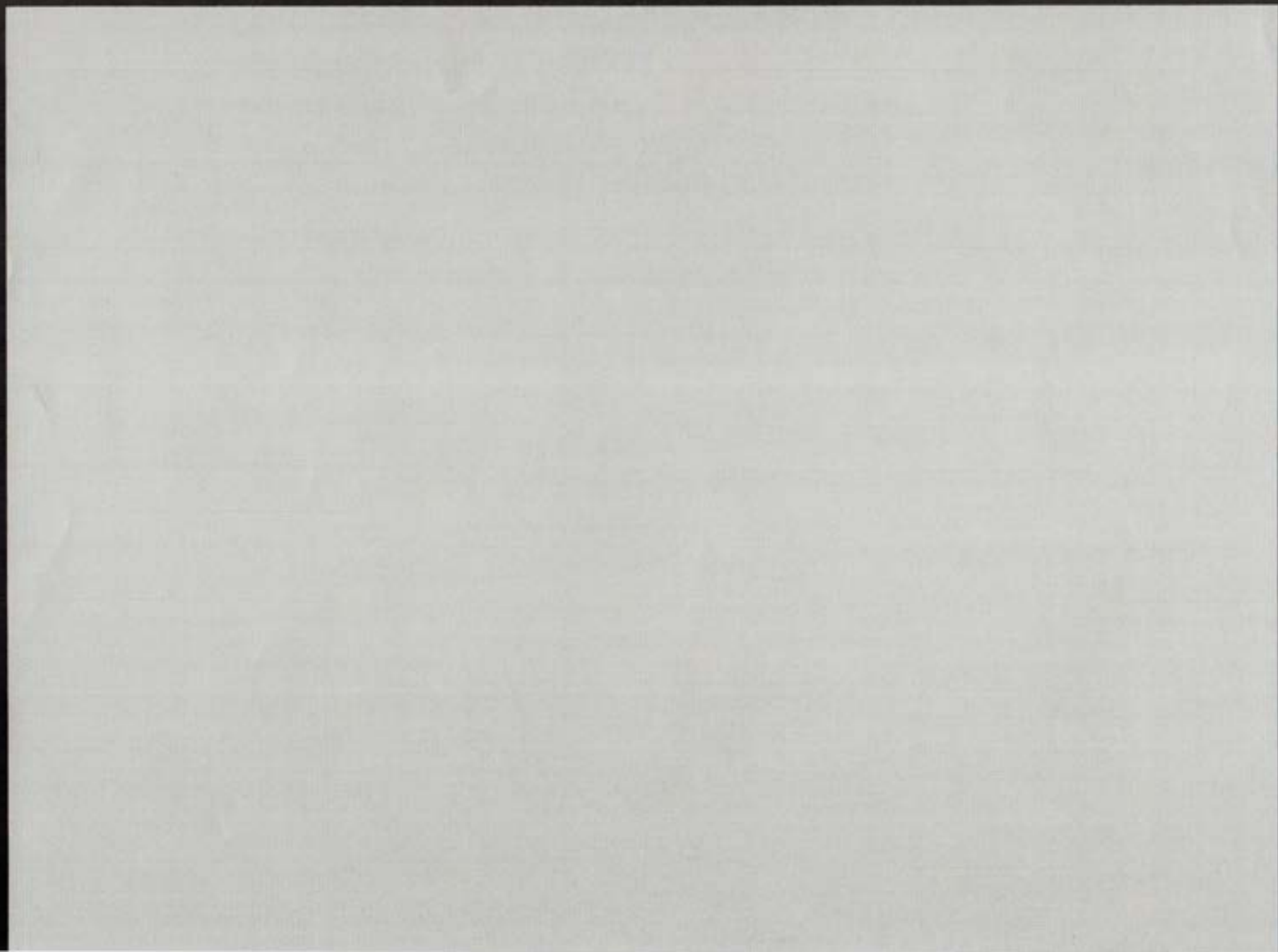

Delta Sigma Theta

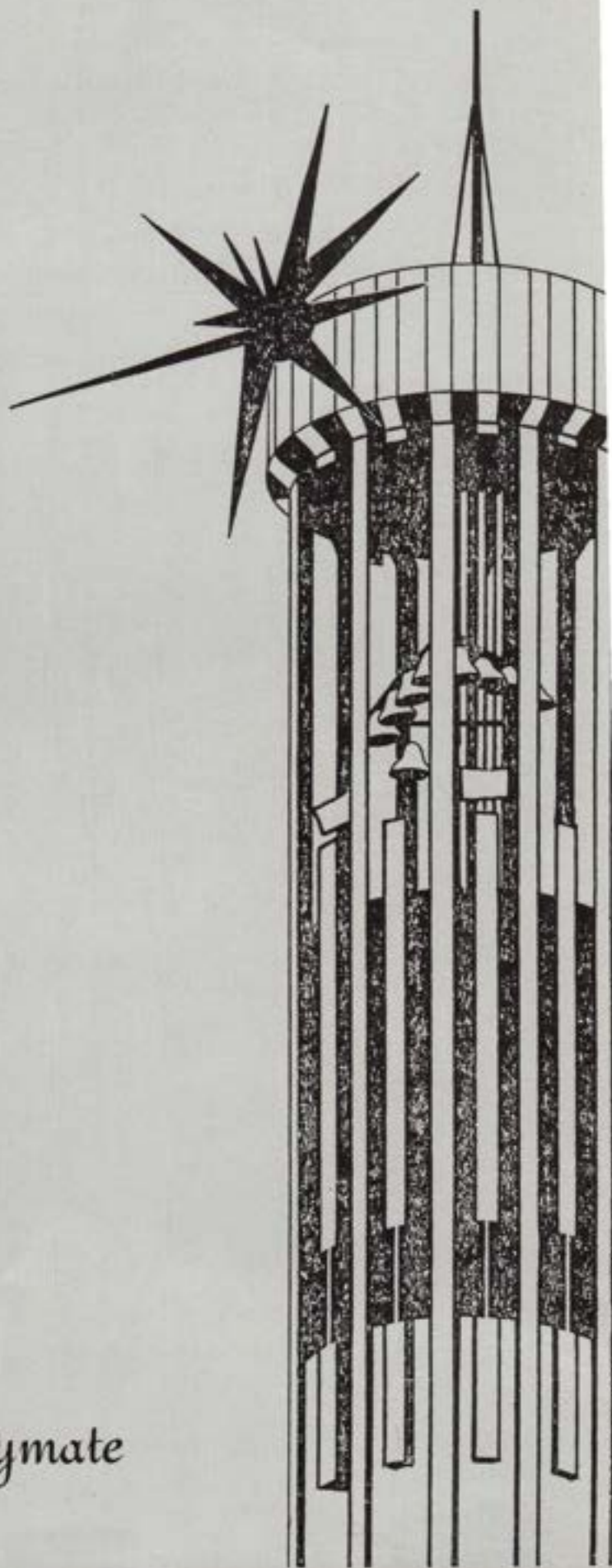

Dr. Harold T. Brinson

Dr. Harold T. Brinson completed his tenth year as president of Southern Arkansas University during the 1985-86 school year. He was recognized during the Honors Convocation.

The 1985-86 year, like every year, brought its share of challenges to the University administration. Perhaps the biggest challenge was contending with decreases in state appropriations. With a little belt tightening and careful planning, Dr. Brinson and his staff pulled SAU through the financial crunch.

On the positive side, Dr. Brinson said he is proud of the accomplishments made by SAU students this year. Among the achievements are the business awards won by Phi Beta Lambda and the conference title won by the Mulerider baseball team.

Also of significance during 1985-86 was the formation of the Economic Development Center. Dr. Brinson said the Center is becoming instrumental in attracting new and expanding businesses to the area and strengthening the economy of South Arkansas.

Dr. Brinson, who is originally from DeQueen graduated from SAU in 1949, when the University was known as Magnolia A & M. He was a member of the Mulerider football team during his student years. He attended Tulane University on a football scholarship and received his bachelor's degree from Tulane in 1951. Dr. Brinson earned his master's degree in 1954 and his doctorate in 1971, both from the University of Texas at Austin.

Dr. Brinson is married to the former Gene Lee, whom he met while a student at A & M. The Brinsons have three children.



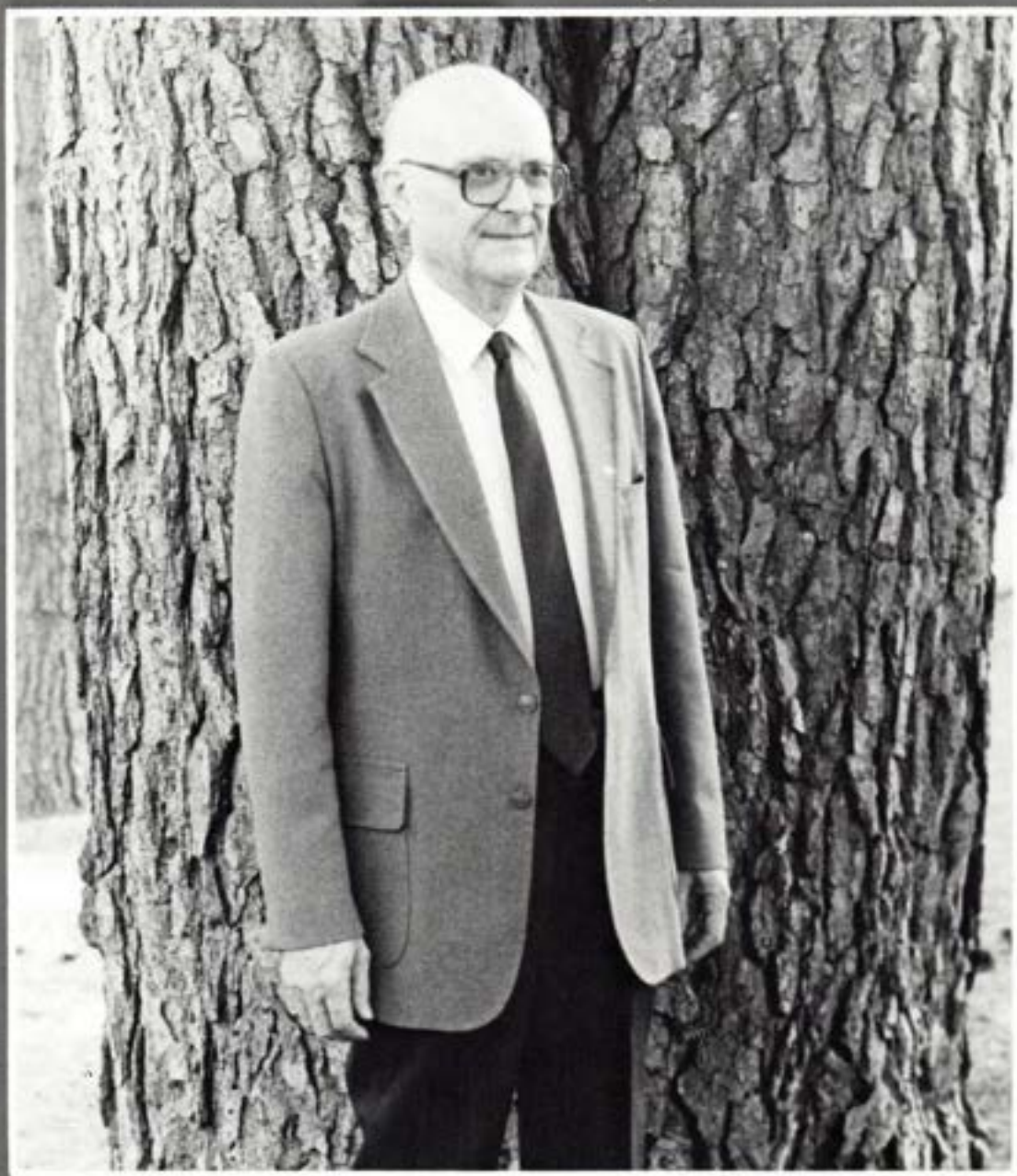

Student Activities



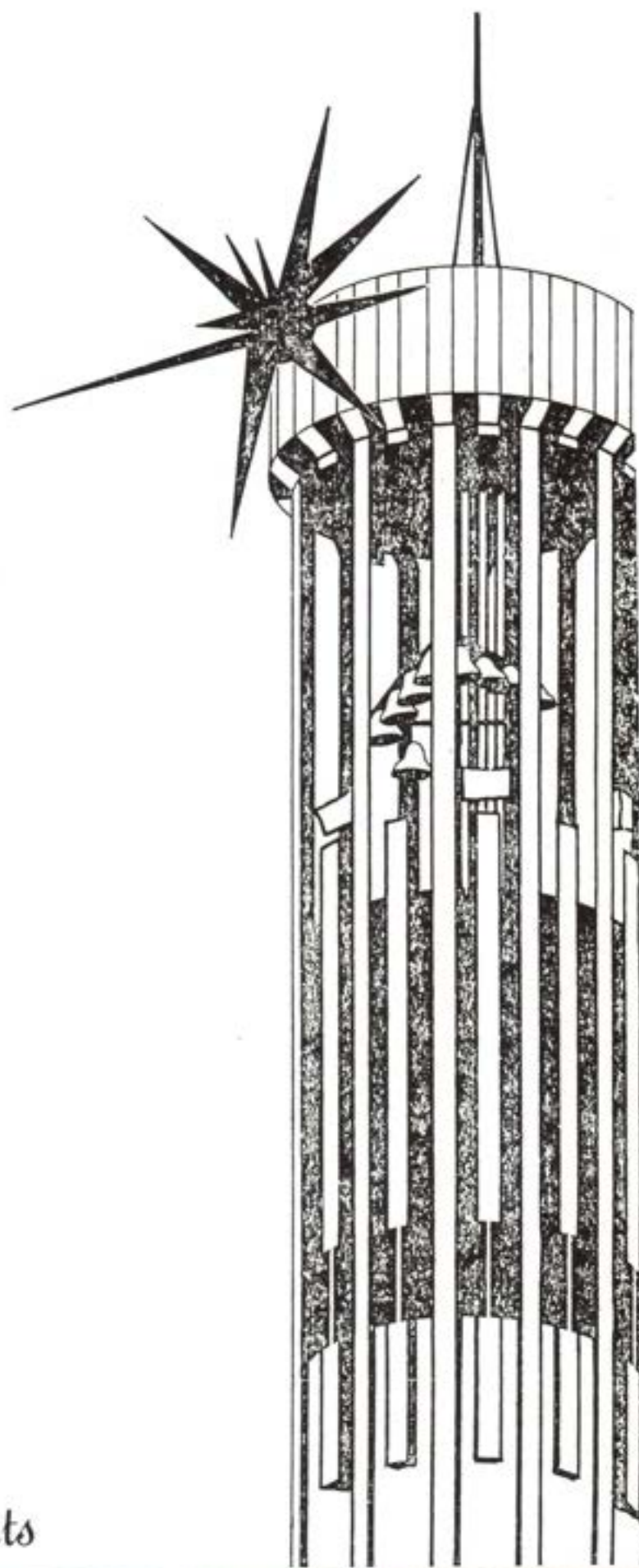

Departments

Office of Financial Aid

The University recognizes that many prospective students of ability and promise need help in meeting their post-secondary expenses. The University makes every effort to encourage and assist such students. Various types of assistance are available, including scholarships, grants-in-aid, student loans, and student employment. The financial aid office handles all applications and requests for aid.



SAU Business Office

The Business Office provides the university with many services: purchase all supplies, equipment, etc.; payroll; insurance; retirement; issue PELL scholarship, work study and loan checks; collect all fees, tuition, room & board, fines, etc.; loan collections; pay all university bills; meal ticket validation; and cash personal checks.



Registrar

The operation of the Registrar's office recognizes the necessity of service orientation and the inherent rights of those to be served. Service is provided for current students, former students, administrators, staff, faculty, and community. Emphasis is placed on service as well as client-centered relationships, confidentiality, and consistency of effort.



Word Processing

The Word Processing Center is a resource department for the entire campus. The Center is equipped with word processing equipment, copy machines, and one high speed printer. The Center types repetitive letters, documents, schedules, catalogues, and other typing jobs for the various departments. Also, all duplicating is done in the copy room of the Center. The Word Processing Center has two full time persons and 7 student helpers.



SAU Counseling Center

The SAU Counseling Center is located in Cross Hall Room 118. The staff is available for listening, without criticism, to any problems - ranging from time management to unwanted pregnancy, chemical dependency, to roommate problems, undecided major to tests necessary for jobs after graduation. 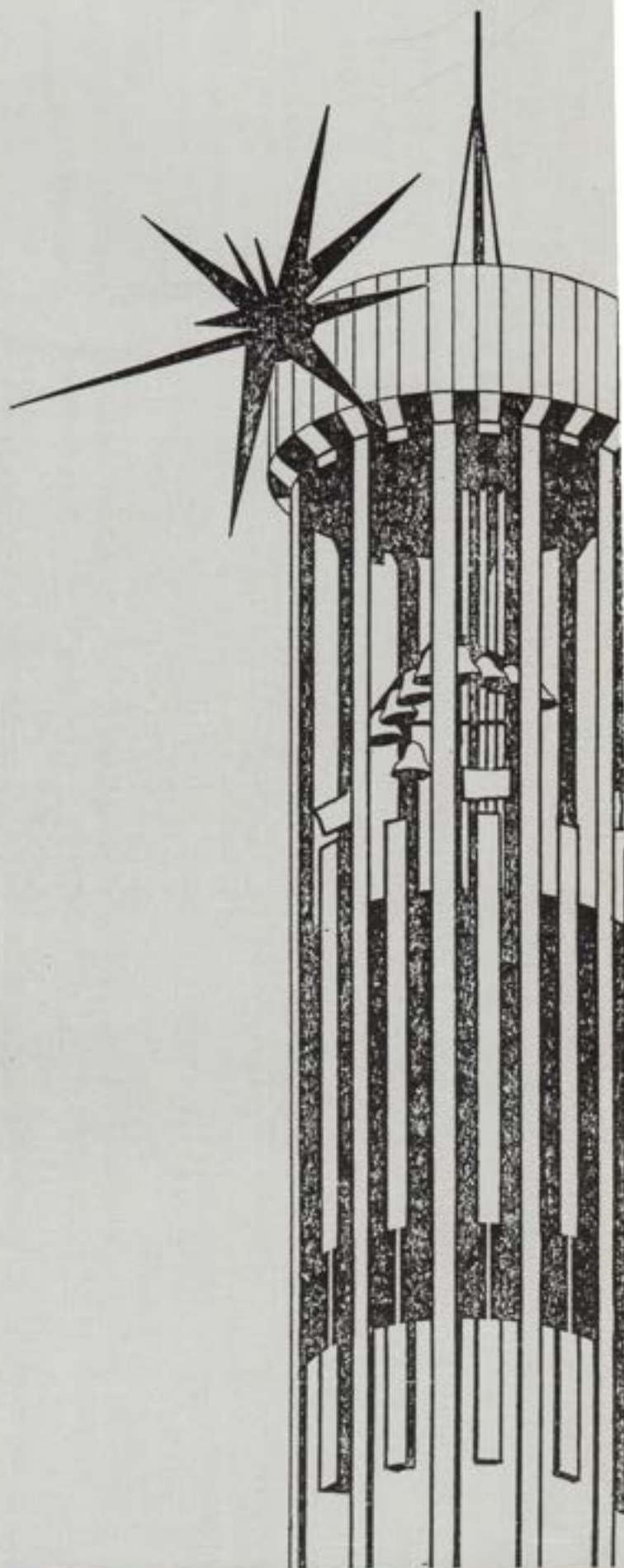

Steve Arnett Resigns

Steve Arnett, head football coach at SAU, has resigned his coaching duties effective immediately, according to a statement released by Athletic Director W.F. Watson.

Arnett succeeded Jimmy 'Red' Parker as head coach following the 1981 season. Before becoming head coach, Arnett served as defensive coordinator for three years at SAU. Arnett's record as head coach over four seasons was 20-18-2. The Muleriders best year under Arnett was 1984 when the 'Riders finished second in the conference, finishing the season 5-4-1 after starting the season with a record of one win and four losses.

In a prepared statement, Arnett said, 'I am submitting my resignation as head football coach of SAU.'

'I have enjoyed my four years here as head coach and I feel that we have fielded very competitive teams. However, after not reaching the goals that we set for the program this year, I think a change is needed for the future of the program.'

Watson had this to say about the resignation. 'We appreciate the contribution Coach Arnett has made to Southern Arkansas University and our football program, and wish him the best of luck in the future.'
