
THE RACE

Theater production focused on injustice of rape

The Department of Theater at SAU presented William Mastrosimone's adaptation of "Extremities" on November 5, 6, and 7.

"Extremities" takes place in an old farmhouse, which is shared by three roommates, Marjorie (Twila Woodell of Stamps), Terry (Debbie Dunwoodie of Magnolia), and Patricia (Rebecca Martin of Bradley). Raul (Kevin Kilpatrick) has been observing the house and its occupants for some time, biding his time, waiting for an opportune moment to make his move.

One day, after Terry and Patricia have left for work, Raul enters and assaults Marjorie. She manages to escape her attacker and, eventually, captures him. She must then decide whether to release him or "fix" him. Later that same day, after her roommates return from work, she tries to involve them in her decision to take matters into her own hands. She bases this decision on the fact that the law probably won't be on her side in the matter. Mastrosimone uses this setting to establish his "courtroom drama."


"Extremities" is a powerful play based upon the testimony of a rape victim who positively identifies her attacker, takes him to court and watches him set free to roam the streets.

Mastrosimone wrote the play not to make a statement, but rather to "do" something to change people's perception of rape. "I wanted to write a courtroom drama, not in court, but in a living room (the most likely place for a woman to be raped in her own home). I wanted to create a psychic trail where all characters shift roles and become plaintiff, defendant, prosecutor, judge, witness, etc. I wanted to show how the rapist can turn the jury around...the result is a 98 percent chance that the rapist will be set free," says Mastrosimone.

According to statistics, the average rapist rapes 29 times and one out of three women in the United States are sexually assaulted by the age of eighteen. Of all the rape cases that are able to pass the strict rules of evidence, only 2 percent ever result in a conviction of the accused attacker. Most rapes go unreported because of embarrassment or fear.

Mastrosimone wishes to dispel two popular myths about rape: 1) women cause rape and 2) rape is committed for sex. Rape is used to humiliate, degrade and intimidate the victim. This is a confusing issue because the tenderest act between a man and a woman is used to disguise the most brutal and sadistic of crimes; the extremities of the spectrum are brought together.


Due to the adult theme and strong language, "Extremities" was recommended for mature audiences. Dr. Jerry Cortez, who directed the production, strongly urged anyone who had been bothered by the "mis-carriage of justice" that occurs during some rape trials to see the production.

"There's humor (in the play), a lot of it, but it is not a children's play. The humor is very dark. In a way, this play is like a cruelty joke."







Election of Student Government officers for the 1988-89 school year was the focus of the 1988 Spring Fling festivities.










The School of Business Administration had an extremely productive year with many curriculum enhancement activities. Some of those activities included:



- * Eighth Annual Business Day—From Little Rock, Hope, El Dorado, Monroe, and Magnolia, business executives came to share their expertise with our students.

- * SIFE—Students in Free Enterprise Team won regional and head for national competition.





SAU has been one of several pilot schools in the NCATE project. In order to meet these new requirements four new staff members have been hired in SAU's department of education within the last two years.


Dr. Robbins says that his school of education has been working hard to meet all standards by next fall.

A successfull year School of Liberal and Performing Arts

The School of Liberal and Performing Arts had a very successful year. One outstanding feature was the artists in-residence program sponsored by Rosemary Rhea and the Arkansas Arts Council. The grant placed three professional artists, a dramatist, a sculptor, and a musician, in residence at SAU. They also worked with students in Magnolia and Walker schools.

The Art Department started its first competition for the generous Shirley Jeffcoat Combs scholarship. And, with the help of the Curriculum Center, the English Department sponsored a very successful writing festival for over three-hundred Arkansas school children.

A new law fraternity was founded, Phi Alpha Delta, and many liberal and performing arts students were involved in band, choir, theatre, radio, yearbook, and newspaper work. In fact, the student newspaper, *The Bray*, was awarded a first-class rating in design and All-American status by the Associated Collegiate Press.

The School of Liberal and Performing Arts is always concerned with its mission to contribute to the general education of all students by developing their skills in communication, by broadening their knowledge of the world, by introducing art and music, and by increasing their skills for living in a democratic society.

Department of General Studies

Many students arrive at the University underprepared or lacking confidence in their abilities to do college-level work. To meet their needs, SAU has pioneered in providing assistance through the Academic Opportunities Program (AOP)—a battery of courses, special tutoring, and other personalized assistance designed to meet the students' individual needs. Course work available is nine hours in reading, nine in writing, six in math, three in psychology, and two in College Survival Skills.

SAU's is one of the most comprehensive such programs anywhere and offers almost a full year's curriculum for those who need or want it. More than 50 percent of the student body take advantage of some aspect of the AOP; some students participate extensively; some need on-

ly a part of the offered assistance. The grade point average for freshmen participating in the AOP is slightly higher than for those not participating.

In addition to the AOP, the Department of General Studies offers a baccalaureate degree in Applied Sciences for students coming to the University with associate degrees in technical fields. Also an associate degree is available to anyone who has completed his general education requirements (except for Fine Arts) and has a total of 64 semester hours with a 2.0 grade point average.

The Department of General Studies is located in Jackson Hall, where free tutoring and counseling are offered on a drop-in basis.



Southern Arkansas University had the second largest chapter membership in the State as well as in the Southern Region. "SAU is not only strong in membership, but also in quality," stated Dr. David Rankin, PBL Advisor and Professor of Economics and Finance. The Phi Mu Chapter received 26 awards at the 1987 State Leadership Conference in Little Rock—including seven first place awards.

Students from SAU competed at the 1987 National Leadership Conference in Anaheim, California, in July. They brought back a second place national award for Alumni membership,


Bray receives award





Angels sponsor show






Alpha Sigma Alpha social sorority has had another successful year on the Southern Arkansas University campus.



This spring the group did volunteer work for the Special Olympics and visited residents of a nursing home in Stamps, Arkansas.





Phi Lambs Are Active and Involved



Sigma Pi: good fun and good works


1987-88 was a good year for the brothers of Sigma Pi. They made themselves known about campus in a variety of ways.





The Brinsons try to be a part of this. It is a rare day when Dr. Brinson does not have the time to visit with students who drop by with problems. He and Gene try to involve themselves with the daily life of the university, and they are found at most of the plays, concerts, lectures, commissions, and games.

It is probably true that someone else could administer the affairs of the university, but it would be difficult to find a president and first lady who bring more genuine affection to the job.

Dr. Pearce says that SAU is a school that he is proud of and would want his children to attend.





Dr. Haefner's hobbies include sailing, snow-skiing, bicycling, water sports and making repairs around the house.







Professor honored



Dr. Margaret Downing, professor of physical education, was named honor professor for 1988 at SAU. She received this honor at the 11th annual honors convocation on May 1.

Considered one of the pioneers in women's athletics in Arkansas, Dr. Downing guided the SAU women's basketball program from 1965-84. During her time at SAU, the Riderettes won eight Arkansas Women's Intercollegiate Sports Association (AWISA) conference titles, and two state championships and Southwest Regional Championships in the years before the AWISA.

Downing also coached teams at Amateur Athletic Union championships from 1963-65. Honored by the Arkansas Association for Health, Physical Education and Recreation in 1974, Downing also was named AWISA Basketball Coach of the year in 1977-78 and 1984 Coach of the Year by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Downing was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in the fall of 1987, and has served on many committees and associations at the state, regional, and national levels including the U. S. Olympic Basketball Committee, U. S. Girls basketball League, and the U. S. Junior Olympic Basketball Committee.

Students receive honors

SAU announced its 1988 Outstanding Students from each school at the 11th annual honors convocation ceremony held May 1.

Kim Pearce McGaughlin was selected as the Outstanding Student from the School of Business Administration.

McGlaughlin graduated with a degree in accounting, having maintained a 4.00 grade point average throughout her studies at SAU. McGlaughlin daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Robert Pearce, recently received the State Phi Beta Lambda Award in Accounting II, as well as the 1988 Wall Street Journal Award, which is the highest academic award a student can receive.

McGlaughlin also held membership in the SAU Student Foundation; Alpha Chi, the National College Honor Scholarship Society; and was an officer in Phi Beta Lambda.

She is the wife of Mae McGaughlin. Susan Renee Wildbur, Nashville, was selected as the outstanding Student from the School of Liberal and Performing Arts.

Wildbur, daughter of Vernon and Nancy Wildbur, had a 3.94 grade point average, and is a history major and a management minor. She served as secretary for Alpha Chi; secretary for the History Club; and historian for Phi Beta Lambda.

Wildbur placed third in office management at the 1987 Phi Beta Lambda State Conference and attended the 1987 National Leadership Conference in Anaheim, CA; is a charter member of Sigma Sigma Sigma Social Sorority, and has served that organization as secretary and as efficiency chairman.

Wildbur worked as a tutor at the Magnolia Boys and Girls Club and has been a volunteer at the Magnolia Special Olympics for the past three years. She has served as secretary in the SAU English Department for two years.

After graduation, Wildbur plans to work for the Arkansas Heritage Commission or the Arkansas Department of Parks and Tourism.

Bearden's practicum in early childhood was completed at Westside Kindergarten, Magnolia, and student taught at Ivory Primary School in Camden, in first grade.




She will be employed at Fairview Elementary School in Camden in the fall of 1988.

Above: Kevin Cotrell stretches before going out on the field.



The Muleriders, with a season record of 5-4-1 and an AIC record of 3-2-1, finished second in a conference that is generally regarded as tough and unforgiving.

The Riders, who had lost their opener with Delta State and rebounded to take a win from a strong East Texas State, went into their third game with high hopes. They beat Morehead State but at the expense of head coach, Rob Hicklin, who suffered a heart attack and was relegated to the press box for several games. The Riders then stumbled against Southeastern Oklahoma, bounced back to take Ouachita Baptist, and then lost to UCA in an agony of fumbles. Coach Hicklin returned to the field in an emotional 17-16 win over Henderson State. The following week the Riders let down to a win hungry Harding. High riding Arkansas Tech managed to escape Rider vengeance with a tie, and, in the final game of the season, the Riders squeezed out a win over U. A. Monticello.

The Riders played aggressive football all season and dominated their opponents in several offensive categories including total first downs, rushing yards, total offense, punts, and kickoff returns. Mark Mason was the leading rusher with 1,51 net yards, and quarterback Alan Hafford led in total offense with 1,512 yards. A hard charging Rider defense was led by Glenn Davis with 104 unassisted tackles and Mike Strickland, who accounted for seven sacks; however, the most telling statistic may well be the thirty-five turnovers, fumbles which cost the Riders the ball twenty-three times.




SAU forward three-time holder of Player of the Week honors

SAU's forward John Holmes was the Arkansas Democrat Arkansas Intercollegiate Conference Player of the Week for three straight weeks. Holmes is a 6-foot-7 sophomore from Eudora.

Holmes had 31 points in an 84-75 win over Henderson, followed that with 32 points in an 80-61 win over Ouchita and had 21 points in a 74-53 win over Hendrix.

SAU Coach Monroe Ingram said of Holmes, "He was just super."

In little more than a year and a half, Holmes had scored 819 points, which ranked him 28th on the Mulerider career scoring leaders list.

The all-time scoring leader is Greg Alexander, who managed 1,886 points in 1975-79.



Holmes scored 405 points his first season, and has already tallied 414 this season with 5 regular season games left to play.


Calvin Thomas holds the single-season SAU scoring record totaling 619 points in the 1952-53 season.

SAU's Eby can play with the best no matter what the age

Sharon Eby clearly remembers the first time SAU women's tennis coach Herman Guevara approached her with the idea of playing collegiate tennis.

"When Coach Guevara and (men's tennis coach) Baylor Guy brought up the idea last year, I thought they were kidding," Eby said. "But I thought about it and said to myself, 'Why Not?'"

Eby was skeptical because she was 45 years old and had been out of college more than 20 years.

But Eby quickly proved that age makes no difference, as she posted a 9-1 record for the Riderettes at the No. 2 singles position. The Magnolia native also finished runner-up in the NAIA District 17 tournament in both singles and doubles.

Not bad for someone whose competitions not even half her age.

"The first few times I stepped on the court, I could see my opponents thinking, 'This is going to be a piece of cake.' But I usually proved them wrong," Eby said. "I think I earned their respect."

Eby was no stranger to Guevara, as she had been practicing with the team for more than two years.

"There aren't many women players her age in Magnolia," Guevara said, "so she would practice against some of our players. I had seen her play in tournaments around here and I knew she was a good player."

"When I found out she had only a year of school left to graduate, I asked her to come out for the team."

"She just loves to play," Guevara added. "She's great to have around. She's been our most consistent player all year. She really gives our players a good workout in practice."

Eby says her younger teammates have helped make the transition to student-athlete much easier.

"They call me 'Mother of the team' or 'Mamma,'" Eby said. "But it's all in good nature." They all encouraged me to go out for the team, and they've been very supportive."

Eby also proved her endurance during the district tournament. After losing in the District 17 finals in both singles and doubles, she headed to Little Rock to play in the Adult Closed Clay Court championships. Eby won all her matches in the women's 45 division round-robin play to capture the title.

She was ranked No. 6 in the Arkansas Tennis Association ranking in women's 35 singles and No. 1 singles for the Shreveport, LA, Volvo team.

Eby's husband, Bill, and son, Kevin, can also hold their own in the sport. Bill was ranked second in men's 45 last year and Kevin was ranked 14 in Boys' 14 division.

Eby, who is on course to graduate in December with a business degree, has only been playing tennis for 11 years. She attended Oklahoma State, but dropped out her senior year.

"I actually got to play more tennis when I wasn't on the team," Eby said. "Now I've got to find time to study. But it's been a great experience for me and it's been fun."

This has given me the opportunity to get a college degree and at the same time play some competitive tennis."

Tennis team successful

The SAU men's tennis team capped off a successful year with a tremendous finish at the NAIA National Tennis Championships in Kansas City, Mo. The Riders, ranked 24th in the nation going into the tournament, created some shock waves at the nationals by finishing tied 13th. They finished ahead of or tied with eight teams who, prior to the championships, were ranked higher in the national polls.

There were 247 participants in the singles draw and the doubles saw 122 teams compete. A total of 52 teams from across the United States were represented at the national tournament.



SAU's baseball coach driving the Muleriders to the top

A successful college program is built around one person.

It's not a quarterback. It's not a powerful forward. It's not a pitcher.

The one constant in college athletics is the coach. A complete turnover in player personnel happens every five years. If a team is to be competitive year in and year out, the coach must be the foundation upon which success is built.

At SAU, that cornerstone is Steve Goodheart. For the second straight season and third time in the last six years, the Mulerider baseball coach has guided his team into the NAIA Area V tournament. Both previous trips ended with World Series berths.

Last year's team finished third in the nation.

When the Riders are on the field practicing or playing a game, it's hard to pick out who's the head coach.

All the men in uniform look young, clean-cut, and like college baseball players. At 33, Goodheart doesn't look much different from his players.

And he's not; except he's the one in charge. He's been the head coach for eight years, arriving in Magnolia in 1980.

"It was tough, it really was back then," Goodheart said of the close age difference. "But not on the field. The players knew I knew more than they did and I knew I knew more than they did."

"But I couldn't buddy-buddy with them. I couldn't socialize with them at all."

Which made things difficult because Goodheart is a quiet, shy man whose first love is baseball. On top of that, he was familiar with SAU having played for the Riders from 1973 through 1976, earning All-AIC honors his junior year.

"I didn't know a soul when I came here from high school (Great Falls, Mont.)," he said. "I was miserable for the first three days, I had to ask where the school was and where the dormitories

were when I first got here."

He stuck around the campus in 1977 to finish work on his degree in English and work as a graduate assistant with the baseball team.

From there, Goodheart went in pursuit of more baseball and a master's degree. He found both in Tucson, Ariz.

"I wanted to go to grad school and stay in baseball," he explained. "So I wrote to every major baseball program in the country."

Several showed an interest, but the University of Arizona had the most to offer.

In 1978, Goodheart made his first visit to big-time college sports.

Under Wildcat Coach Jerry Kendall, Goodheart was one of a handful of underpaid, overworked graduate assistants. It was a perfect situation.


At Arizona, Goodheart learned the fine points of college coaching: organization, practice schedules, drill techniques and fundamental instruction. He also learned to live on nothing but a love of the game.

"I worked as a janitor then and I

nearly starved," Goodheart said. "I even sold my blood for money. I was down there with the bums from skid row...I only did that once."

He also picked up a master's degree in physical education, with a specialty in biomechanics.

"Yeah, I had some misgivings about his youth," SAU Athletic Director, W. T. Watson, said about hiring Goodheart in 1980. "But we're a little different here. Everyone here coaches have the time and Steve fit in perfectly."

ly because he teaches English.

"But Steve is totally dedicated to baseball," he continued. "As a player, he was an outstanding student. And he had all the good qualities we were looking for in an individual, with the exception of experience."

But since Goodheart had three years experience as a graduate assistant at the college level, Watson decided to give Goodheart a chance and the new coach took over a program that hadn't won an AIC title since he was a player.

Goodheart's first two teams went a combined 22-57 and 10-19 in AIC play.

"Those first couple of years were tough," Goodheart said. "We were so lousy and I made a lot of mistakes. It was hard for the players to get used to me and for me to get used to them."

Then he turned the corner.

In 1983, largely with players he had recruited, the Muleriders won the league and Area V titles and went to

the World Series where they finished eighth. The team finished 29-12 and boasted nine players who batted over .300.

"It seemed like 'his team' went from being one of us, to being better than everybody in the conference," said Ouachita Baptist's Van Barrett, the elder statesmen among AIC coaches.

What Goodheart had overcome in his first two years were administration demands and his own shyness in recruiting.

"Back then, I was more worried about administrative things - getting umpires, buses, practice schedules," Goodheart said. "I almost worried more about the administrative aspect than about practicing.

"And, I was not good at recruiting because I was kind of timid," he admitted. "But the more you do it, the

better you get. I knew I had to do it or get out."

It has now become one of his strengths. He recruits primarily over the telephone and has a strong network of coaches and former players who pass along tips on prospects.

"He is definitely pulling in better players than the rest of us," Barrett said. "He has good connections with the junior colleges and he recruits well out of Arkansas and then molds those players into a team." But he doesn't just blend baseball players together, he creates winners.

"Our practices are now geared toward winning," Goodheart said. "We practice the hit and run, drag bunts, scoring runners from third and taking extra bases. We work on the things it takes to win."

In the 41 years of AIC baseball prior





to Goodheart's arrival in Magnolia, SAU won or shared seven titles. In the last eight seasons, the riders have won or shared four crowns.

Goodheart has been named Coach of the Year in the AIC three times, District 17 twice, including this season, and Area V once.

Last year, the Riders entered Area play with a No. 4 national ranking. They own the same ranking again this season.

"I think we can be a top 20 team pretty consistently," Goodheart said. "But top 10...give us a few more years of doing what we've done the past few years."

What the Muleriders have done in the last few years is establish themselves as the best baseball program in the AIC. In the process, they've

also established a reputation on a national level.

"SAU was nothing for a while," Barrett said. "Now we see them third, fourth, 10th nationwide."

"What can I say?" Watson said. "They don't play a game and move from eighth to fourth in the poll."

"But I'll tell you something, you look at their schedule and we play teams from districts in Indiana, Wisconsin, Minnesota and five districts in the northern United States and we beat the dog out of those people," Watson added. "And then those teams have gone back and done well in their leagues. So 'Goodheart's teams' are getting national recognition from other areas because of this."

Winning translates into confidence. SAU's players know it and opponents

know it.

"I'd like for our guys to think they're in charge when they go out on the field, not be intimidated by anybody we play," Goodheart said. "We're at the point now where teams come in here and have respect for us when they play us."

"They know how to win," Barrett said. "They ooze a little confidence that seems to intimidate other teams."



Headed back to the top

The SAU track team, under the guidance of Dr. Richard Carter who took over as track coach following the resignation of Charles Moseley last year, made a surprisingly strong showing this year. Dr. Carter filled in this season until new coach, Dan Veach, can take over in the fall of 1988. SAU athletic director, W. T. Watson, said during a press conference when it was announced that Veach would be the new coach, "I am indebted to Dr. Carter for the job he has done this season." Veach vowed to do his best to return the Muleriders to a traditional force in the AIC in the near future.




Dr. Norman speaks at commencement
