This section of the MULERIDER is inscribed with the special achievements of these people and is dedicated to the initiative and specialities of students at Southern State College.

"All men are created equal," but not in all respects — some excel while others do not. The individuals on the following pages have been recognized by fellow students and professors as outstanding. Even so; we cannot say that they are the only personalities on campus because each student is a "personality" in his own right.

Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities

The idea of creating one national basis of recognition for college students that would be democratic and devoid of cost to the student originated in 1935, when Mr. H. Pettus Randall instituted "Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities."

Each year students are nominated from approximately 775 colleges and universities. Selection of nominees is conducted by campus committees and involves a student-faculty-administration participation. Nominating committees are requested to consider the student's scholarship (at SSC a 2.5 grade point is required), his leadership and co-operation and extracurricular activities, his general citizenship, and his promise of future usefulness.

Each student who becomes a member receives a certificate of recognition awarded by the organization and presented at the school, recognition in the annual publication for the year during which he was selected, and benefits of

the Student Placement Service provided by the organization.

Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities is designed to render greater, though less conspicuous service: as a goal to inspire in those who may not otherwise perform to the best of their ability; as a reminder that time must be used intelligently to bring the best results from one's college experience; as a means of compensation for outstanding efforts and achievement; as a standard of measurement for students comparable to other recognized scholastic and service organization.

Active participation increases each year through the interest of qualified colleges and universities. Such a history means that there was a place for the organization in colleges and universities at the time it was initiated and that since its establishment, it has filled a need there. With continued cooperation from the schools, its future should be one of ever-increasing prestige and service to the student.





Fine Arts



Southern State College and the surrounding area provide an unlimited number of cultural opportunities. On campus, students enjoy a cultural arts series and excellent performances of the best of choral music by the Concert Choir and the Town and Gown Choir. The Concert Band presents the best of orchestra compositions in fall and spring concerts. During the year individual students and the Concert Choir represented Southern State on the Channel 12 television program, College Music Hall. The South Arkansas Symphony includes college students and faculty musicians. In cooperation with the English Department, the Cameo Theater of Magnolia has begun a series of Cultural Arts Films to be presented throughout the year. In addition to the activities on campus, the Shreveport Repertory Opera Company presents twelve concerts each year featuring ballet, opera, full orchestra and guest artists. The El Dorado Community Concert Series brings to the area such famous artists as Peter Nero, Chicago Opera Ballet, and the Chicago Little Symphony. These programs offer a variety of entertainment in the cultural arts.

The Southern State College Town and Gown Choir is a campus choral organization which accepts any one in the Magnolia area who sings, regardless of experience or ability. Singers are drawn from the community as well as from faculty and students.

The Southern State College Concert Choir was organized four years ago by Kermit T. Breen, director of vocal music. The group consists of thirty-six voices selected from members of the larger Town and Gown Choir and membership is considered an honor. The participants include the music majors studying at Southern State College. Every member spends a minimum of five hours each week in rehearsal.

The Concert Choir has done much public relations work for the college. Each year a Christmas concert and a spring concert are presented plus many incidental programs in the community. During the early spring the choir goes on a tour generally lasting from three to five days and usually including the central and southern half of the state.

Mr. Kermit Breen, director of vocal music, was invited by the Shreveport Opera Symphony Company to sing in the performance of *La Traviata*. Last fall the choir independently presented "The Marriage of Figaro," with major roles being sung by Southern State voice majors. They presented performances in Magnolia, Little Rock, El Dorado, and Mena.

The Concert Choir tries to present the best of choral literature, performing sixteenth to twentieth century concert music and sometimes including Broad-material.


Tau Beta Sigma, a national honor band sorority, was established during World War II, when young ladies entered the field of band music and assisted the university and college bands in maintaining a full organization.







AIC CHAMPIONS

With the fine leadership of Coach W. T. Watson, the Southern State basketball team won their first AIC title since 1936 with a superb conference record of 16-2 and an overall season mark of 23-5. The Riders — third in the nation defensively in the final NAIA statistics — then went on to capture the regional NAIA tournament at Pine Bluff to gain the honor of representing Arkansas in the national NAIA tournament at Kansas City.

The Riders were led in scoring by All-AIC Bill Burson and in rebounding by second team All-AIC selection Donnie Denton.

Losing only one senior from this year's team, Bill Askew, the Riders figure to be the prime target in next year's conference race, and hope to repeat as AIC champions.

Southern State Football

This year the Muleriders finished 5th in football in the AIC standings. Coaches "Rip" Powell, Auburn Smith, and Delwin Ross worked hard with the Riders but were unable to maintain the winning combination. The team's AIC record was three wins and four losses. The Riders won one non-conference game and lost to three tough non-league foes to finish with a season of four wins and six defeats.


STATISTICAL LEADERS

This year the Muleriders managed to score in almost every division of the AIC individual statistics. Leading the Riders was Johnny Tune who ranked fourth in passing with 378 yards. Johnny attempted 170, completed 85 and passed 6 for touchdowns. Johnny also ranked fifth in total offense with 963 yards, with 85 yards rushing. Jim Leonard ranked seventh with 503 yards in 91 carries in yards rushing and averaged 5.6 yards. Travis Giles caught 37 passes for 684 yards and 6 touchdown passes to take second place in AIC pass receiving. Selected for All-AIC Honorable Mention were Steve Elliot and Jim Leonard on the Offensive team and Donnie Alpe on the Defensive team.












