






First Came Registration And the Waiting Began





Caps and Gowns Replace Beanies and Crowns

It pleases me to have the opportunity of sharing in the record of your school year through your 1968 Mulierider.



Trustees Sets College Policies

The Board of Trustees is the legal agency invested with the authority to determine the general policies of the College. The members give of their time to lead the school, keeping in mind the best interests of the College and the students. The Board has the responsibility of determining all policies, fixing tuition rates and fees, appointing college officials and prescribing courses of instruction.

Appointments to the Board are made by the Governor and confirmed by the Arkansas Senate. Each of the five members, appointed in consecutive years, serves a five-year term on the Board.

Serving a second term as officers for the Board are J. H. Wilson, President; Doyne Hunnicutt, Vice President; and D. O. Talbot, Secretary.

Applications for student work on campus go through the office of Bernard Polk, Director of Financial Aid. Authorization for work-study payments is made by his office. He also supervises loans, grants and scholarships for the students.

All students come in contact with Mrs. Ann Thomas and Paul Kirkpatrick, Counselors. They administer the ACT test, Sophomore test and the graduate tests. The counselors work with students in personal problems and school related problems.

The Registrar's Office, manned by James Smyth, keeps a record of every student from the time of his application to SSC until his graduation. Prospective students apply to this office and are accepted, or sometimes rejected, as students. As graduation nears, hopeful graduates go over credits and file applications for degrees.

As Secretary of the Alumni Association and Editor of the Southern Stater, Milton Talley still maintains his close relationship with the students.

Business Manager R. H. Cole and Margaret Atchison, Accountant, work closely in supervising the money handled at the college. The budget is prepared and a detailed account of expenditures is maintained in their offices. Every month students form lines at the Business Office to receive pay checks, sign meal tickets, and pay room and board.









Riders Defeat A&M, Finish Second

The Mulerider football team upset arch rival Arkansas A&M, 1967 conference champion, 21-19 to finish in a three-way tie for second place with State College and Arkansas Tech in the fall grid campaign.

The Riders had another up and down season this fall, caused by a rash of injuries to key personnel. However, Coach Auburn Smith, in his 20th year with the Mulerider coaching staff, kept enough players healthy to compile a 3-2-1 conference record and a 5-3-1 season record.

Travis Giles, senior split end from Texarkana, and Calvin Smith, senior defensive halfback from Hamburg, were named to the all-conference team.

Giles, a three-year choice for All-AIC, established an all-time conference pass receiving record by catching 136 aerials for 2336 yards and 19 touchdowns during his four-year career.

Both Giles and Smith played in the first annual AIC All-Star Game Nov. 27 at Monticello.

With 22 returning letterman and 15 starters returning from a 22 man platoon system, the Muleriders should be battling for the top spot in the AIC race again next year.



Riders Look Impressive—Defeat Livingston 25-7

The big question mark at the start of this season was the fullback position. With three of the Rider's prospects already out for various reasons, Robert Dotson was moved from his halfback position to take over the chores at fullback. He quickly erased any doubts that anyone might have had by carrying 12 times for 103 yards to lead the Muleriders to a 25-7 victory over the Livingston State Tigers in their season opener.

SSC's first score came with 5:53 left in the first period when quarterback Stanley May sneaked over from one yard out to cap a 54-yard march. Rusty Kauffman's extra point attempt was no good leaving the score at 6-0.

Early in the second quarter, flankerback Jerry Harrell broke Livingston's back with a dazzling 68-yard punt return for SSC's second touchdown. Kauffman's PAT was good making the score 13-0.

The Riders scored their third touchdown in the waning minutes of the first half when May hit split end, Travis Giles, from 19 yards out to climax a 74-yard drive. Kauffman missed the PAT attempt,

and SSC led 19-0 at the half.

Halfback Phil Trotter, SSC's leading ground gainer, scored the Riders' final touchdown late in the third quarter on a 5-yard run around left end to end a 60-yard march. The kick was blocked and the score remained 25-0.

Livingston's only score came late in the game against the SSC reserves. The PAT was good ending the night's scoring at 25-7.

SSC Harasses Harding 26-9 in AIC Opener

The Muleriders continued to look good the following week when they defeated the Harding Bisons 26-9 in their conference opener. Featured in SSC's balanced attack were the running of speedster Phil Trotter along with the deadly air strikes from May to Giles.

Trotter gained 91 yards on 13 carries, one for a 45-yard touchdown, while May connected on 11 of 24 passes for 133 yards, including two touchdown strikes to Giles.

SSC hit paydirt midway into the first quarter when fullback Robert Dotson busted over from the 1-yard line. Kauffman's extra point attempt was wide making it 6-0, SSC.

The Bison's made it 6-3 on a 22-yard field goal early in the second quarter, but the Riders increased

their lead five minutes later with Trotter's 45-yard touchdown run. The PAT attempt failed making the score 12-3 and ending the first half scoring.

Harding scored its only touchdown with 10 minutes left in the third quarter. The extra point failed leaving the score 12-9.

This was as close as Harding was to come, though, as the Riders scored on their next possession of the ball. This drive was climaxed by a 33-yard touchdown pass from May to Giles. Kauffman's kick was good for a 19-9 lead.

May again connected with Giles for 23 yards and another touchdown late in the third quarter. Kauffman's extra point was good and ended the night's scoring at 26-9.

Leon Anderson, Tech's quarterback, kept the Mulerider secondary off-balanced all night with similar short passes to his big ends, while SSC couldn't get a drive started.

A 36-yard field goal late in the fourth quarter ended the night's scoring and gave SSC its first loss of the season, 13-0.

Ouachita's first tally came on a 37-yard field goal in the second quarter making the score 14-3.


The second half belonged to the Tigers, however, as they scored three consecutive touchdowns to lead 23-14 with three minutes left in the game.

The Mississippians scored from seven yards out to climax a 78 yard march for their first score. The kick was good making the score 7-0.


The Choctaws increased their lead to 14-0 with a six-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.



Stunned A&M recovered from the Southern aerial attack and scored three touchdowns in the final 13 minutes of the first half.


After a scoreless third quarter, Southern marched 71 yards to score the winning touchdown with 1:48 left to play.












Engineering Club





Youth Christian Association
